In the Chamber of the House of Representatives, for the purpose of receiving such communication as Her Excellency Maura T. Senators Lovely, Mark, Rausch, Timilty, Durant and Fattman were appointed on the part of the Senate; and Representatives Balser of Newton, Farley-Bouvier of Pittsfield, Owens of Watertown, Worrell of Boston, Kushmerek of Fitchburg, Howard of Lowell, Philips of Sharon, Barrows of Mansfield, Kane of Shrewsbury and Xiarhos of Barnstable were appointed on the part of the House.

Shortly thereafter, Her Honor the Lieutenant-Governor, Kimberly L. Driscoll, the Constitutional officers, members of the Executive Council, members of the Supreme Judicial Court, and distinguished guests entered the Chamber under the escort of the Sergeant-at-Arms.

The President in the Chair, then introduced Reverend Clyde D. Talley, Senior Pastor, Belmont A.M.E. Zion Church, Worcester, who delivered the following Invocation:

There are so many families that need affordable housing so they can afford to live here in our state and not leave to get affordable housing elsewhere.

High-quality Education – Provide this administration the wisdom, financial, and physical resources need to help rebuild our education system so that every resident who lives in this state has access to quality education from early education to higher education.

We also need Safe & Reliable Transportation to help people get to where they need to go to do what they need to do. Provide the resources and direction that is needed to accomplish this objective.

Lord we also ask that you break down the walls or the barriers that hold people back from achieving the American dream. Provide the path that we need to take to help make Massachusetts a more affordable state where people no matter who they are don't' feel a need to leave this state to survive or to be successful.

Lord we ask that you bless our Governor, Lieutenant Governor and their cabinet and staff members to be the best that they can be. Bless their coming in and their going out. May you bless their work and help them to accomplish the objectives that have been set for the state. Put a hedge of protection around them and keep them in your care. Let this state be a role model that other states will want to follow. And I also ask that our Governor and Lieutenant Governor serve more than 1 term as there is a lot to accomplish and we need them at the helm to get this done with your help.

Grant them and us wisdom and we ask that in our duties we have Your help; in difficulty, Your counsel; in peril, Your protection; and in sorrow, Your peace.
