JOURNAL OF THE SENATE

Thursday, August 17, 2023.

Met at ten minutes past eleven o'clock A.M. (Mr. Timilty in the Chair) (having been appointed by the President, under authority conferred by Senate Rule 4, to perform the duties of the Chair).

The Chair (Mr. Timilty), members, guests and staff then recited the pledge of allegiance to the flag.

There being no objection, the Chair (Mr. Timilty) handed the gavel to Mr. Pacheco for the purpose of an introduction. Mr. Pacheco then introduced, in the rear of the Chamber 2 of Taunton high school's championship teams. The first team introduced was girls softball team, who are the 2023 MIAA Division I Softball State Champions. The team finished with an impressive record of 24-1 and won their third straight state championship title and eighth state title overall. The bill was signed by the Acting President (Mr. Timilty) and sent to the House for enactment.

Reports of Committees.

PAPERS FROM THE HOUSE.

The Senate petition of Michael J. Adjournment in Memory of John F. "Jack" Hurley.

The Senator from Norfolk, Plymouth and Bristol, Mr. Timilty, moved that when the Senate adjourns today it do so in memory of John F. "Jack" Hurley.

John F. "Jack" Hurley, a World War II Navy veteran and a resident of Easton for the past 55 years, passed away peacefully surrounded by his loving family on November 16, 2022, following a brief illness. Jack was 6 days shy of celebrating his 100th birthday.

Born in Boston in 1922 to Charles V. and Elizabeth (Gitto) Hurley, he was raised and educated in Stoughton, and attended Bridgewater State College. Prior to enlisting in the United States Navy, he was the manager and operator of the family farm, Hurley's Dairy, for several years.

Jack entered World War II, serving as Motor Machinist Mate Second Class aboard the USS Landing Craft Support (L)(3)63, a landing craft support ship based in the Asiatic Pacific.

On April 17, 1945, Jack and his 60 crewmates arrived at Okinawa Island of Japan. There, he participated in the Battle of Okinawa - codenamed Operation Iceberg. Although the joint Army-Marine Corps landings on Okinawa were initially unopposed, the well dugin Japanese defenders soon put-up fierce resistance. The battle involved 60,000 American servicemen and lasted three months and included some of the worst kamikaze attacks of the war.

According to Naval records, his ship, though assigned to create a large smoke screen around our US ships to hide them from the Japanese, managed to sink three enemy boats and bring down one kamikaze plane while on patrol.

The ship remained at Okinawa until July 21, when the smoke machine finally broke, Jack told the Boston Globe.

In 2017, Jack told his story to Congressmen Joseph Kennedy III as part of the "Library

of Congress Veteran History Project," an ongoing initiative to preserve the stories of veterans by recording a video of them. He joined the Navy in 1944 because he "felt like helping out," he told Kennedy, as reported in the Boston Globe. "I just loved the water," Jack is quoted as saying. "That's why I picked the Navy; I was always around the water."

Jack came home from his tour in the Pacific in January 1946.

After being honorably discharged, he enrolled in an engineering program at Wentworth Institute of Technology, earning a certificate.

Jack was employed by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts for 36 years as an Assistant Chief Engineer for the State Highway Division.

His work history included construction on Defense projects, performing highway surveys, highway construction supervision, and traffic engineering. His skills in high-demand, he went on to be a consultant for several private highway engineering firms before fully retiring.

A life member of both the American Legion Post 7 and the Knights of Columbus Council 238, both in Easton, Jack was also a member of the St. Vincent de Paul Society. He was an avid fisherman, and expert cribbage player. Moreover, Jack will always be remembered for his engaging smile, positive outlook, and outgoing personality. Nothing made him happier than spending time with his family and friends.

He was the husband of the late Katharine (Mahoney) Hurley and Anne (Kelley) Hurley.

Jack is survived by his children, John C. Hurley and his wife Carol of Easton, Timothy V. Hurley and his partner Lori of Easton, Eileen M. Hurley and her partner Glenn of Gardner, Paul D. Hurley and his wife Kelley of Easton, and Maureen A. Willard and her husband John of Easton; a sister, Virginia Nolan of West Bridgewater; 15 grandchildren (Jane, Mark, Michael, Brian, Sean, Katie, Allie, Clover, Brad, Rob, Jack, Sarah, Meghan, Shannon, and Jake), 17 great-grandchildren (John, Catherine, Charles, Mary, Eva, Lucy, Jack, Francesca, Frankie, Brian, Timothy, Greg, Connor, Colton, Eoghan, Olivia, and Grant); a son-in-law Joe Peters; several nieces, nephews, and cousins. He was the father of the late Katharine F. Peters and brother of the late Mary Maloney and Charles L. Hurley. Jack also leaves behind many dear friends at the Residence, where he enjoyed the last 7 years of his life.

He is truly missed by those who knew and loved him.

Accordingly, as a mark of respect to the memory of John F. "Jack" Hurley, at twenty-one minutes before twelve o'clock noon, on motion of Mr. Tarr, the Senate adjourned to meet again on Monday next at eleven o'clock A.M.
