Opening Roll Call

- Chair Fiola called the opening roll at 3:01pm and welcomed Commission members to the meeting.
- The minutes for the previous meeting were approved unanimously by those present.

- Chair Kennedy made a motion to approve the creation of the subcommittees and the Chairs of those subcommittees. Senator Barrett seconded. The motion passed unanimously.
- Chair Fiola stated members will receive communications from Subcommittee Chairs regarding next steps in the next week or so. Members are also allowed to attend any Subcommittee meeting they want as a non-voting member, by emailing staff and the Chair of that subcommittee. All subcommittee meetings will also be public meetings.
- Chair Fiola took a moment to remind members of the mission of the subcommittee:
 - Developing a comprehensive plan for promoting and celebrating the 250th anniversary of the Revolution;
 - o Identifying all opportunities for individuals, municipalities or other actors across the commonwealth to participate in celebrations of the anniversary and recognize the particular history of their geographical areas;
 - o Investigating and promoting under-represented voices in the American Revolution including, but not limited to, women, native peoples and persons of color;
 - And finally, by submitting a report that will include an overview of the commonwealth's particular role in the American Revolution and notable battles, events and figures of the era.

- Discussion unfolded regarding a Boston history museum, and efforts by the Massachusetts Historical Society according to Catherine Allgor to find a space downtown in Boston as a "pop-up", maybe turned permanent space to exist as a central point during the 250th Celebrations, and Paula Renkas reiterated that it should be interior space.
- Suzanne Taylor and others also discussed how that ties into the ongoing celebrations of Boston's 400th in 2030.
- Chair Fiola suggested that discussion can continue in the Subcommittees on how to tie in this museum space and 400th anniversaries.

Update from Revolution 250

Updates regarding Boston Tea Party Celebrations

Nathaniel Sheidley from Revolutionary Spaces presented on projects and programs they are taking on in regard to the 250th Anniversary of the Boston Tea Party. These projects are ongoing through 2023

- Their organization comprises two separate spaces, Old State House, Old South Meeting House
- Events include:
 - January 2023, 225th Anniversary of the Sacred Cod, Replica of the Cod, from the Old Statehouse
 - o A Year of Conversations, including panels on
 - Exploring the Tea Party in historical context
 - Wide ranging conversation with leaders and icons,
 - Celebrating and educating about activism today
 - o Challenge and Reflect exhibit on the power of protest
 - o Exhibit on Power of petitions,
 - Powerful antislavery petitions were presented, broader exhibit, other groups who did not have the franchise at those times
 - o Day-long poetry workshops with youth, Boston poets
 - Phillis Wheatley Peters
 Celebrating her legacy
 - o History Slam
 - o Retelling of the Meeting of the Bod of the People at Old South Meeting House
 - o Celebration of American Protest Music

Evan O'Brien, the Creative Manager from Boston Tea Party Ships & Museum presented on their own projects and programs in regard to the Boston Tea party.

- The reenactment of the Tea Party will be taking place in December 2023, with expected thousands of participants along the waterfront observing. Planning a commemorative year leading up to that day, starting one year before on December 16th 2022
- Goals of bringing awareness to the significance of the event, creating programming to encourage public education, engage with schools both locally and nationally with various educational initiatives, and encourage visitation to the City of Boston

- o Running a program for descendants of the Boston Tea Party
- o Boston Tea Party Participant Grave Marker Project
- o Tea Donation, kids across the Commonwealth can donate
- o Phillis Wheatley Exhibit
- Full Reenactment, carefully choreographed and taking place over 30 minutes, throwing tea from two vessels
 - With that engaging the historical, hospitality and travel communities
- Also will be a tie in with Sail Boston coming that summer, many statewide, national and international partners
- Paula Renkas asked if there was an official list of original participants in the Tea Party and was told there would be an update in the coming months, and it will be posted on the Boston Tea Party Ships and Museum website.

Closing Roll Call

Chair Fiola is looking at all of these great events and wants to make sure we find ways to encourage schools and educational opportunities for students outside of Boston. Michael Lawson encouraged the group to look at and work with local organizations, like Concord that has a committee that are scheduling and programming events.

Casey Cullen stated that the National Convection of Social Studies Teachers, 4500-5000 teachers will be coming around the time of the Tea Party, and that they had just opened up the EMK Institute for them.

Chair Fiola asked for a motion to adjourn, Chair Kennedy motioned, and the motion was seconded by Senator Barrett and the motion was passed. Chair Fiola then took a closing roll call around 4:15pm.





Programming Goals


Bring international awareness to the Boston Tea Party's pivotal role in the lead up to the American Revolution.




