By Representatives Ross of Attleboro and Poirier of North Attleborough, a petition (subject to Joint Rule 12) of George Ross and others for legislation to categorize bath salts, so-called, as a class C substance. The Judiciary.

**In the Year Two Thousand Eleven**

An Act to include substituted cathinones, also known as "bath salts," in class C substances.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

1 SECTION 1. Section 31 of chapter 94C, as appearing in the 2008 Official Edition, is  
2 hereby amended by adding, after the words, "(16) 4-Bromo-2, 5-Dimethoxy-amphetamine", in  
3 line 235, the following:-

4 "(17) 3, 4 - methylenedioxy methcathinone, MDMC

5 (18) 3, 4 - methylenedioxy pyrovalerone, MDPV

6 (19) 4 - methylmethcathinone, 4-MMC

7 (20) 4 - methoxymethcathinone, bk-PMMA, PMMC

8 (21) 3, 4 - fluoromethcathinone, FMC

9 (22) Napthylpyrovalerone, NRG-1

10 (23) Beta-keto-N-methylbenzodioxolylpropylamine

- 11 (24) 2-(methylamino)-propiophenone; OR alpha-(methylamino)propiophenone
- 12 (25) 3-methoxymethcathinone
- 13 (26) 4-methyl-alpha-pyrrolidinobutyrophenone
- 14 (27) 2-(methylamino)-1-phenylpropan-1-one
- 15 (28) 4-ethylmethcathinone
- 16 (29) 3,4-Dimethylmethcathinone
- 17 (30) alpha-Pyrrolidinopentiophenone
- 18 (31) beta-Keto-Ethylbenzodioxolylbutanamine
- 19 (32) 3,4-methylenedioxy-N-ethylcathinone”.
