By Representative Peake of Provincetown and Senator Jehlen, a joint petition (accompanied by resolve, House, No. 2047) of Sarah K. Peake and others for an investigation by a special commission (including members of the General Court) relative to lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender aging. Public Health.

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year Two Thousand Thirteen

Resolve establishing a special commission on LGBT aging.

1 Resolved, SECTION 1. There shall be a special commission to investigate, analyze and 2 study the health, housing, financial, psycho-social and long-term care needs of older lesbian, gay, 3 bisexual and transgender (LGBT) adults and their caregivers and to make recommendations to 4 improve access to benefits and services where appropriate and necessary. The special 5 commission shall consist of twenty members including the House and Senate chairs of the Joint 6 Committee on Elder Affairs, or their designees, who shall serve as co-chairs; the secretary of 7 elder affairs, or a designee; the secretary of housing and community development, or a designee; 8 the commissioner of public health, or a designee; the director of the LGBT Aging Project, or a 9 designee; the director of Fenway Health, or a designee; the executive director of GLAD, or a 10 designee; a representative of the National Association of HIV Over Fifty; the executive director of MassEquality or a designee; the executive director of the Massachusetts Home Care 11 12 Association, or a designee; the director of AARP Massachusetts, or a designee; the executive 13 director of the Massachusetts Association of Councils on Aging Inc., or a designee; the director 14 of the Massachusetts Nursing Home Federation, or a designee; the director of the Massachusetts 15 Council of Home Care Aides, or a designee; and five members appointed by the governor, one 16 of whom shall be a member of the Massachusetts bar who practices elder law; one of whom shall 17 be an expert in LGBT public policy or research; and three LGBT elders, at least one of whom 18 shall be transgender. The Governor's appointees shall insure at least one representative is from 19 Cape Cod, as well as the western and central portions of the state.

20 The commission shall also examine the impact of state policies and regulations on LGBT

- 21 older adults and make recommendations to ensure equality of access, treatment, care and
- benefits. The commission shall examine strategies to increase provider awareness of the needs
- 23 of LGBT older adults and their caregivers and to improve the competence of and access to

- 24 treatment, services and on-going care, including preventive care. The commission shall assess
- 25 the funding and programming needed to enhance services to the growing population of LGBT
- 26 older adults and to examine best practices for increasing access, reducing isolation, preventing
- 27 abuse and exploitation, promoting independence and self-determination, strengthening
- 28 caregiving, eliminating disparities, and improving quality of life.

29 In particular, the commission shall examine the extent to which policies and practices, or 30 the absence thereof, promote the premature admission of LGBT older adults to institutional care 31 and to recommend, as appropriate and necessary, lower-cost and culturally appropriate home and 32 community-based alternatives. The commission shall also examine the feasibility of developing 33 statewide training curricula to improve provider competency in the delivery of health, housing 34 and long-term support services to older LGBTs and their caregivers, as well as outreach 35 protocols to reduce apprehension among LGBT elders and caregivers of mainstream providers. 36 The commission, in formulating its recommendations, shall take into account the best policies 37 and practices in other states and jurisdictions. The commission shall be empowered to hold

38 regular public meetings, fact-finding hearings and other public forums as it considers necessary.

39 The commission shall file its recommendations, together with recommendations for legislation,

40 if any, with the clerks of the House of Representatives and Senate within 12 months of the first

41 convening of the commission.
