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An Act relative to the administration of Naloxone.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

1           SECTION 1: Chapter 123 of the General Laws is hereby amended by inserting the  
2 following section

3           Section 35A. When naloxone has been administered as a means to treat an opiate-related  
4 overdose, a doctor may hold the patient for a period of up to 3 hours without the consent of the  
5 patient if the doctor deems it medically necessary.
