

**HOUSE . . . . . No. 2236**

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**The Commonwealth of Massachusetts**

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**In the Year Two Thousand Nine**  
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An Act relative to establishing a commission to study the reorganization of municipal public safety agencies..

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

1           SECTION 1. Notwithstanding any general or special law to the contrary, there shall be a  
2 special commission to study the feasibility and practicality of authorizing municipalities of the  
3 commonwealth to merge their police and fire departments into single cohesive public safety  
4 agencies, under a unified command structure, while maintaining proper emergency services  
5 which will enable cities and towns to continue operations smoothly and more efficiently after  
6 police and fire unification.

7           The commission shall consist of 13 members; the lieutenant governor of the  
8 commonwealth, who shall chair the commission; 4 members of the senate, 3 of whom shall be  
9 appointed by the senate president, 1 of which shall be a member of the committee on public  
10 safety and 1 of which shall be a member of the committee on municipalities & regional  
11 government, and 1 of whom shall be appointed by the senate minority leader; 4 members of the  
12 house of representatives, 3 of whom shall be appointed by the speaker of the house, 1 of which  
13 shall be a member of the committee on public safety and 1 of which shall be a member of the

14 committee on municipalities & regional government, and 1 of whom shall be appointed by the  
15 house minority leader; the secretary of the executive office of public safety or his designee; and 1  
16 member appointed by each of the following organizations: the Massachusetts municipal  
17 association, the Massachusetts association of police chiefs, and the Massachusetts firefighter's  
18 association.

19       The scope of the commission's inquiry shall include, but not be limited to:

20       Assessing existing fire and police recruit training programs and identifying ways in  
21 which new recruits could be cross-trained to take on both the roles of police officers and  
22 firefighters

23       Identifying cost efficiencies and savings of merging police and fire departments under  
24 single unified command structures, including salary, pension, and healthcare cost savings

25       Identifying logistical problems associated with merging police and fire departments, and  
26 possible solutions to those problems

27       Identifying current legal and political impediments to the merging of police and fire  
28 departments, and possible solutions to those impediments

29       Analyzing any impact on emergency services posed by merging police and fire  
30 departments, and possible solutions to overcome those impacts

31       Identifying any other incentives and disadvantages to merging police and fire  
32 departments

33           Recommending legislation that will promote and provide municipalities the authority to  
34 effectively merge police and fire departments, if they so choose, while maintaining effective  
35 emergency services under a unified department and command

36           Creating a report that contains the result of its investigation, including any  
37 recommendations that could be used as a framework for legislation necessary to carry out each  
38 recommendation accompanied with an explanation of the legislative intent of each draft  
39 proposal.

40           The commission shall submit its report and findings, along with any drafts of legislation,  
41 to the governor, the joint committee on municipalities and regional government, the joint  
42 committee on public safety and homeland security, the office of the senate president, the office  
43 of the senate minority leader, the office of the speaker of the house of representatives, the office  
44 of the house minority leader, and the clerks of the house of representatives and the senate not  
45 later than January 31, 2010.
