## The Commonwealth of Alassachusetts

An Act to the disclosure of postoperative ocular care..

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

- SECTION 1. Chapter 112 of the General Laws, as appearing in the 2004 Official
- 2 Edition, is hereby amended by adding the following new section:-
- 3 Chapter 12 DD: Postoperative Care After Eye Surgery
- 4 (a) If a surgeon delegates the responsibility for postoperative care for a patient for
- 5 whom the surgeon performed eye surgery, the surgeon may do so only by entering into a
- 6 comanagement agreement with an ophthalmologist or optometrist under the provisions of this
- 7 section.
- 8 (b) Except as provided in section (c), a surgeon who performs eye surgery shall be
- 9 physically available to the patient for postoperative care in the community in which the operation
- was performed for at least 48 hours after the surgery is completed.

11	(c) A surgeon who performs eye surgery may delegate the responsibility for the first
12	48 hours of postoperative care for the patient to another person if the delegation occurs through a
13	management agreement that meets the requirements of this section and the person to whom the
14	responsibility is delegated is
15	i. An optometrist; or
16	ii. An ophthalmologist
17	(d) In order to satisfy the requirements of this section, a comanagement agreement for
18	post operative care of a patient must meet the following requirements:
19	i. The agreement may only be entered into
20	when
21	1. the distance the patient would have to travel to the regular office of the operating
22	surgeon would result in an unreasonable hardship for the patient, as determined by the patient;
23	2. the surgeon will not be available for postoperative care of the patient as a result of
24	the surgeon's personal travel, illness;
25	3. other justifiable circumstance exist, as determined by the Board of Registration in
26	Medicine
27	ii. The agreement may not provide a fee to the
28	person to whom the care is delegated that does not reflect fair market value of the services
29	provided by the person;

30	iii. The agreement may be entered into only if
31	the surgeon confirms that the person to whom the care is delegated is qualified to treat the patient
32	during the postoperative period and is licensed or certified to provide the care, if required by law;
33	iv. The agreement may not take effect unless
34	there is written statement in the surgeon's file and in the files of the person to whom
35	postoperative care is being delegated that is signed by the patient in which the patient states the
36	patient's consent to the comanagement agreement and in which the patient acknowledges that the
37	details of the comanagement agreement have been explained to the extent required under (5) of
38	this subsection;
39	v. The details of the agreement shall be
40	disclosed to the patient in writing before surgery is performed; the disclosure required under this
41	paragraph must include:
42	a. The reason for delegation;
43	b. The qualifications, including licensure or certification, of the person to whom the
44	care is delegated
45	c. The financial details about how the surgical fee will be divided between the
46	surgeon and the person who provides the postoperative care
47	d. A notice that, notwithstanding the delegation of care, the patient may receive
48	postoperative care for the surgeon at the patient's request without the payment of additional fees;

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until the patient is postoperatively stable;

A statement that the surgeon will be ultimately responsible for the patient's care

- f. A statement that there is no fixed date on which the patient will be required to return to the referring health care provider; and
- g. A description of special risks to the patient that may result from the comanagement
  agreement.
  - (e) A surgeon may not enter into a comanagement agreement governed by this section:
- 56 a. Under which two or more physicians or optometrists agree to comanage patients of 57 the surgeon as a matter of routine policy rather than on case by care basis;
  - b. That is not clinically appropriate for the patient

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- 59 c. That is made with the intent to induce surgical referrals; or
- d. That is based on economic consideration affecting the surgeon
- 61 (f) An ophthalmologist or optometrist may not require, as a condition of making 62 referrals to a surgeon, that the surgeon must enter into a comanagement agreement with the 63 ophthalmologist or optometrist for the postoperative care of the patient who is referred.
  - (g) An ophthalmologist or optometrist to whom postoperative care is delegated under a comanagement agreement governed by this section may not further delegate the care to another person, regardless of whether the other person is under the supervision of the ophthalmologist or optometrist.
  - (h) It is an affirmative defense to a prosecution under this section or in disciplinary proceeding for violation of this section that the surgeon delegated postoperative care of a patient

- because of unanticipated circumstances that were not reasonably foreseeable by the surgeon
- before the surgery was performed.
- Section 2. The board shall promulgate rules and regulations to implement section 1.
