By Representative O'Day of West Boylston and Senator Hart, a joint petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 1506) of James J. O'Day and others relative to prohibiting mandatory overtime for certain health care workers. Public Health.

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year Two Thousand Eleven

An Act protecting patients from preventable medical errors by prohibiting mandatory overtime.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. Chapter 111 of the general laws, as appearing in the 2006 Official Edition,
2 is hereby amended by inserting after section 56 the following sections:-

3 Section 56A. In sections 56A to 56B, inclusive, the following words shall have the
4 following meanings:

5 "Health Care Workforce", personnel that have an effect upon the delivery of quality care
6 to patients, including, but not limited to, licensed practical nurses, unlicensed assistive personnel
7 and/or other service, maintenance, clerical, professional and/or technical workers and other
8 healthcare workers.

9 "Hospital", a hospital licensed under section 51 of chapter 111, the teaching hospital of
10 the University of Massachusetts medical school, a licensed private or state-owned and state-
11 operated general acute care hospital, or an acute care unit within a state-operated facility;

12 provided, however, that “hospital” shall not include a licensed non-acute care hospital classified
13 as an inpatient rehabilitation facility, or a long term care hospital.

14 “Nurse”, a registered nurse licensed under section 74 of chapter 112 or a licensed
15 practical nurse licensed under section 74A of said chapter 112.

16 “Mandatory Overtime”, any employer request with respect to overtime, which, if refused
17 or declined by the employee, may result in an adverse employment consequence to the
18 employee. The term mandatory overtime with respect to an employee means any hours worked
19 by a nurse or the health care workforce to deliver patient care, beyond the predetermined and
20 regularly scheduled number of hours that the employer and employee have agreed that the
21 employee shall work.

22 Section 56B. (a) A hospital shall not require or permit a nurse to work more than 12
23 hours in any given shift or to exceed 16 hours in a 24 hour period. A nurse may not be
24 disciplined, dismissed or discharged for refusing to work beyond the hours specified in this
25 paragraph. A nurse who works 12 consecutive hours in a shift shall be given at least 8 hours off
26 from any work between shifts.

27 (b) Except in cases of a federal or state government declared public emergency, or a
28 facility-wide emergency, no facility may employ mandatory overtime for either nurses or the
29 health care workforce.

30 (c) Nothing in this section shall be construed to limit, alter or modify the terms,
31 conditions or provisions of a collective bargaining agreement entered into by the hospital.
