An Act relative to funeral home vehicle lights..

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 Section 1. Section 7E of chapter 90 of the General Laws, as appearing in the 2008
2 Official Edition, is hereby amended by adding the following paragraph:-

3 A vehicle either owned or leased by a funeral home establishment, a licensed or
4 registered certified funeral director, or a livery company and operated by a funeral director, an
5 employee or an independent contractor of a funeral home may have mounted thereon flashing,
6 rotating or oscillating purple/violet, amber and or clear/white lights. Such vehicle may have
7 alternating flashing headlights and fog lights, and display a flashing, rotating or oscillating red
8 light in the opposite direction in which the vehicle is proceeding facing rearward on the vehicle.
9 Such lights shall only be illuminated when such owner or operator is proceeding in a funeral
10 procession as defined in chapter 310 of the Acts of 2010, or responding to a fatality on behalf of
11 the Chief Medical Examiner’s Office and at no other time. A permit for the vehicle or use of
12 said lights shall not be required from the Registrar of Motor Vehicles.

All vehicles in a funeral procession may display the vehicle hazard warning signals.
