By Mr. Lewis of Winchester, a petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 458) of Jason M. Lewis and others for legislation to impose a penalty for the confinement of farm animals in a manner that does not allow them to turn around freely, lie down, stand up, and fully extend their limbs. The Judiciary.

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year Two Thousand Eleven

An Act to prevent farm animal cruelty.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1	SECTION 1. Chapter 272 of the General Laws is hereby amended by adding the
2	following
3	section:
4	Section 106.
5	(a) The purpose of this section, subject to exceptions, is to prohibit the confinement
6	of farm animals in a manner that does not allow them to turn around freely, lie down, stand up,
7	and fully extend their limbs.
8	(b) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, a person is guilty of unlawful
9	confinement of a covered farm animal if the person tethers or confines any covered animal, on a
10	farm, for all or the majority of any day, in a manner that prevents such animal from:
11	(1) Lying down, standing up, and fully extending his or her limbs; and

12	(2) Turning around freely.
13	(c) This section shall not apply:
14	(1) During scientific or agricultural research.
15	(2) During examination, testing, individual treatment or operation for veterinary
16	purposes.
17	(3) During transportation.
18	(4) During rodeo exhibitions, state or county fair exhibitions, 4-H programs, and
19	similar
20	exhibitions.
21	(5) During the slaughter of a covered animal in accordance with the provisions
22	of Chapter 94, sections 139C and 139D of the General Laws, and other applicable laws and
23	regulations.
24	(6) To a pig during the seven-day period prior to the pig's expected date of giving
25	birth.
26	
27	(d) For the purposes of this section:
28	(1) "Calf raised for veal" means any calf of the bovine species kept for the
29	purpose of producing the food product described as veal.

30	(2) "Covered animal" means any pig during pregnancy, calf raised for veal, or
31	egg-laying hen who is kept on a farm.
32	(3) "Egg-laying hen" means any female domesticated chicken, turkey, duck,
33	goose, or guinea fowl kept for the purpose of egg production.
34	(4) "Enclosure" means any cage, crate, or other structure (including what is
35	commonly described as a "gestation crate" for pigs; a "veal crate" for calves; or a "battery cage"
36	for egg-laying hens) used to confine a covered animal.
37	(5) "Farm" means the land, building, support facilities, and other equipment that
38	are wholly or partially used for the commercial production of animals or animal products used
39	for food or fiber; and does not include live animal markets.
40	(6) "Fully extending his or her limbs" means fully extending all limbs without
41	touching the side of an enclosure, including, in the case of egg-laying hens, fully spreading both
42	wings without touching the side of an enclosure or other egg-laying hens.
43	(7) "Person" means any individual, firm, partnership, joint venture, association,
44	limited liability company, corporation, estate, trust, receiver, or syndicate.
45	(8) "Pig during pregnancy" means any pregnant pig of the porcine species kept for
46	the primary purpose of breeding.
47	(9) "Turning around freely" means turning in a complete circle without any
48	impediment, including a tether, and without touching the side of an enclosure.
49	(e) Any person who violates any of the provisions of this chapter is guilty of a
50	misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine not to exceed one
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- 51 thousand dollars (\$1,000) or by imprisonment in the county jail for a period not to exceed 180
- 52 days or by both such fine and imprisonment.
- 53 SECTION 2. This chapter shall take effect no later than January 1, 2015.
