## The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year Two Thousand Eleven

An Act relative to the forensic sciences advisory board.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1	SECTION 1. Chapter 6 of the General Laws, as appearing in the 2008 Official
2	Edition, is hereby amended by striking out section 184A and inserting the following new
3	section:-
4	There shall be in the executive office of public safety and security a forensic
5	sciences advisory board, hereinafter called the board, which shall advise the secretary on all
6	aspects of the administration and delivery of criminal forensic sciences in the commonwealth.
7	The board shall consist of the undersecretary for forensic sciences, who shall also serve as
8	chairperson of the board, the attorney general, the colonel of the state police, the president of the
9	Massachusetts Chiefs of Police Association, the president of the Massachusetts Urban Chiefs
0	Association, the president of the Massachusetts District Attorney's Association, a district
1	attorney designated by the Massachusetts District Attorney's Association, the commissioner of
2	the department of public health and the Chief Counsel of the Committee for Public Counsel
3	Services, or their respective designees, three scientists, experienced in delivery, management or

14 oversight of scientific services, one of whom shall be a forensic scientist with practical 15 experience in an accredited crime lab, one of whom shall have a specialty in the natural or biological sciences and one of whom shall have a specialty in the physical sciences, and two 16 17 members of the bar with experience in criminal practice and forensic science issues, one each to 18 be appointed on recommendation of the Massachusetts Bar Association and Boston Bar 19 Association. The members shall serve without compensation, except that, with respect to the 20 three scientists, reasonable travel expenses may be paid for the purpose of attending meetings. 21 Each appointed member shall serve for a term of three years or until a successor is appointed and 22 qualified, whichever is longer. The board shall meet no less than quarterly and as otherwise 23 convened by the undersecretary. The board shall coordinate its responsibilities with the medico-24 legal investigation commission and shall not infringe upon the commission's authority as 25 established in section 184 of this chapter.

26 At the direction of the board, the undersecretary for forensic sciences shall 27 advise the board on the administration and delivery of forensic services in the commonwealth. 28 The undersecretary shall include in his report information as the board requests, including but 29 not limited to the volume of forensic services required for each county, including costs and the 30 length of time from submission for testing or procedures and return of results; the capacity of the 31 commonwealth's forensic services and funding requirements; the accreditation of forensic 32 facilities and training of personnel; facilities expansion, including location and funding for a new 33 state police crime lab; and partnerships with other public and private forensic services. The 34 undersecretary shall make recommendations for the allocation of resources and expansion of 35 services, and on an annual basis, submit budget recommendations to the secretary of public 36 safety and security and the board.

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
