By Ms. Spilka, petition (accompanied by bill, Senate, No. 134) of Karen E. Spilka, Chris Walsh, Denise Provost and other members of the General Court for legislation to form a commission on for-profit schools [Joint Committee on Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure].

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

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In the Year Two Thousand Eleven
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An Act to form a commission on for-profit schools.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 There is hereby established a special commission created for the purpose of
2 studying and making recommendations concerning the impact of proprietary schools receiving
3 public investments in the form of federal and state financial aid on residents of the
4 Commonwealth who are or have been enrolled in these institutions. The commission shall
5 consist of 16 members: 1 of whom shall be the undersecretary of consumer affairs and business
6 regulations or his designee, who shall serve as chair; 1 of whom shall be the commissioner of
7 higher education or his designee; 1 of whom shall be the commissioner of the board of
8 elementary and secondary education or his designee; 1 of whom shall be the attorney general or
9 her designee; 2 of whom shall be the house and senate chairs of the joint committee on consumer
10 protection and professional licensure; 1 of whom shall be appointed by the speaker of the house;
11 1 of whom shall be appointed by the senate president; 1 of whom shall be appointed by the
12 minority leader of the house; 1 of whom shall be appointed by the minority leader of the senate;
13 1 of whom shall be a representative of the Crittenton Women’s Union; 1 of whom shall be a

14 representative of The Midas Collaborative. Four members shall be appointed by the
15 undersecretary of consumer affairs and business regulations; 1 of whom shall be a representative
16 of the general public who was enrolled or is currently enrolled in a for-profit college or
17 proprietary institution in the Commonwealth, 2 of whom shall represent proprietary schools,
18 including one accredited school that is eligible to receive state and federal aid and one that is
19 non-accredited and ineligible to receive state and federal aid and 1 of whom shall represent a
20 consumer advocacy group such as MassPIRG.

21 The commission shall include, but not be limited to, review of the organization
22 of proprietary school oversight in Massachusetts; studying and making of recommendations for
23 possible consolidation of oversight authority into a single entity or other efforts to provide
24 increased oversight; examination of the need for improved financial auditing procedures and
25 improved enforcement of relevant Massachusetts consumer protection laws, including, but not
26 limited to, the areas of advertising, recruitment, retention, financial aid practices, credit transfer
27 practices, and fees or penalties; an assessment of the adequacy of free or low-cost loan
28 counseling and legal support for Massachusetts residents in default on student loans; research
29 into the need for increased consumer education about proprietary schools and the financial
30 responsibilities associated with student loans; drafting recommendations to provide consumers
31 with greater transparency regarding schools' compliance with state and federal laws, loan default
32 rate, or schools which have been sanctioned in Massachusetts or in other states; making
33 recommendations with regard to requiring counseling of students considering financing their
34 proprietary school education in-part with loans.

35 The commission shall be empowered to hold regular public meetings, fact-
36 finding hearings, and other public forums, as it considers necessary.

37 The commission shall file its recommendations, together with
38 recommendations for legislation, if any, with the house and senate clerks who shall forward the
39 same to the general court no later than 2 years after the passage of this act. The commission
40 shall file a progress report, along with any recommendations for legislation prepared by that
41 time, no later than 1 year after passage of this act.
