The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year Two Thousand Eleven

An Act creating a special commission on institutional long term care services.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. Notwithstanding any general or special laws to the contrary, there
2 shall be a special commission established to examine the Commonwealth's institutional long
3 term care system, which shall recommend a plan to provide a seamless transition to a continuum
4 of long term care services for elders and persons with disabilities that recognizes the central
5 place of consumer choice and consumer control in any long term care setting; evaluate options
6 and prepare policy recommendations regarding potential savings to the commonwealth achieved
7 by reducing the number of MassHealth licensed nursing home beds; develop recommendations
8 as to the criteria to be used to determine which beds are de-licensed, provided that said criteria
9 shall include at a minimum established Quality Indicators and other quality measures, such as
10 staffing levels, turnover rate and training options for direct care staff; and to consider any

11 programmatic or financial incentives to reduce the number of nursing home beds, convert said
12 beds to sub - acute beds or other uses, or otherwise more efficiently use the institutional long
13 term care facilities in the Commonwealth.

14 The commission shall consist of 15 members, 1 of whom shall be the secretary
15 of health and human services or his designee, 1 of whom shall be the secretary of elder affairs or
16 her designee, 1 of whom shall be the director of the office of Medicaid or her designee, 1 of
17 whom shall be the Attorney General or her designee, 1 of whom shall be the Auditor or his
18 designee, 1 of whom shall be the house chair of the joint committee on elder affairs, 1 of whom
19 shall be the senate chair of the joint committee on elder affairs, 1 of whom shall be the senate
20 chair of the joint committee on health care financing, 1 of whom shall be the house chair of the
21 joint committee on health care financing, 1 of whom shall be a consumers or consumer
22 surrogates member of the PCA quality home care workforce council approved by a majority of
23 the Council, and 5 persons to be appointed by the governor, 1 of whom shall be a health care
24 economist, 1 of whom shall be a representative of 1199 SEIU, 1 of whom shall be a
25 representative of the Statewide Independent Living Council, 1 of whom shall be a representative
26 of the Massachusetts Extended Care Federation, 1 of whom shall be a representative of Mass
27 Home Care, and 1 of whom shall be a representative of the Mass Alzheimer' s Association. The
28 commission shall be co-chaired by the senate and house chairs of the joint committee on elder
29 affairs.

30 The commission shall meet within 30 days of passage, and not less than
31 quarterly thereafter, and shall release its first recommendations to the house and senate
32 committees on ways and means no later than 24 months after passage.
