The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year Two Thousand Thirteen

An Act to protect the peace and privacy of the residents of the Commonwealth.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. Chapter 93 of the General Laws as appearing in the 2010 official edition is
2 hereby amended by inserting after subsection (d) in section 49, the following section:

3 (e) Notwithstanding any rule, regulation, or General Law to the contrary, and except in
4 the case of express permission of a court of competent jurisdiction, or as reasonably necessary to
5 effectuate a post-judgment judicial remedy, a debt collector shall not communicate with any
6 person other than the debtor, his attorney, a consumer reporting agency if otherwise permitted by
7 law, the creditor, the attorney of the creditor, or the attorney of the debt collector. Express
8 permission given by the debtor to contact the third party shall not exempt the debt collector from
9 the provisions set forth under this paragraph. Any violation of this paragraph shall constitute an
10 unfair or deceptive business practice as outlined by Chapter 93A of the General Laws.
