The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year Two Thousand Thirteen

An Act creating a special commission on institutional long term care services.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. Notwithstanding any general or special laws to the contrary, there
2 shall be established a Special Commission on Institutional Long Term Care. This Commission
3 shall evaluate options and prepare policy recommendations necessary to address excess skilled
4 nursing home bed inventory, to reform the skilled nursing home licensing and de-licensing
5 processes, and to establish more rational processes for the closure of skilled nursing homes.
6 Such recommendations shall include policy options concerning the following:

7 Potential savings to the Commonwealth and improvements to care delivery that could be
8 realized by reducing the number of skilled nursing facility beds;

9 Criteria to be used to determine which beds should be de-licensed, including but not
10 limited to quality care standards and measures of regional geographic need;

11 Potential incentives for skilled nursing home operators that would help to reduce the
12 number of skilled nursing facility beds and/or would facilitate conversion of under-utilized beds
13 to other uses;

14 Improvements to the MassHealth reimbursement system for skilled nursing facilities; and

15 Any other recommendations as needed to more effectively utilize institutional long term
16 care facilities in the Commonwealth.

17 SECTION 2. The Commission shall consist of 15 members, 1 of whom shall be the
18 secretary of health and human services or a designee, 1 of whom shall be the secretary of elder
19 affairs or a designee, 1 of whom shall be the director of the office of Medicaid or a designee, 1 of
20 whom shall be the Attorney General or a designee, 1 of whom shall be the State Auditor or a
21 designee, 1 of whom shall be the house chair of the joint committee on elder affairs or a
22 designee, 1 of whom shall be the senate chair of the joint committee on elder affairs or a
23 designee, 1 of whom shall be the senate chair of the joint committee on health care financing or a
24 designee, 1 of whom shall be the house chair of the joint committee on health care financing or a
25 designee, 1 of whom shall be a member of the PCA quality home care workforce council, and 5
26 persons to be appointed by the governor, 1 of whom shall be a representative of the Department
27 of Public Health, 1 of whom shall be a representative of 1199SEIU, 1 of whom shall be a
28 representative of the Massachusetts Senior Care Association, 1 of whom shall be a representative
29 of AARP, and 1 of whom shall be a representative of the Massachusetts Alzheimer's
30 Association.

31 SECTION 3. The Commission shall meet within 60 days of passage of this Act, and not
32 less than quarterly thereafter, and shall release final recommendations to the Senate President,
33 the Speaker of the House, the Joint Committee on Elder Affairs and the Health Planning Council
34 no later than one year from passage of this Act.
