The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the One Hundred and Eighty-Ninth General Court (2015-2016)

An Act relative to the penalty for resisting a police officer.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

- SECTION 1. Chapter 265 of the General Laws, as appearing in the 2008 Official
- 2 Edition, is hereby amended by inserting after section 13L the following new section:—
- 3 Section 13M. Any person who shall knowingly and willfully obstruct, resist, interfere
- 4 with, or oppose any police officer, firefighter, correction officer, or other officer in serving any
- 5 process, rule or order issued by a lawful authority; or who knowingly and willfully shall obstruct,
- 6 resist, interfere with, or oppose any such officer in the lawful performance of his duties may be
- 7 punished by imprisonment in a jail or house of correction for not more than one year or by a fine
- 8 of not less than \$100 nor more than \$250, or both. Any person suspected of violating this section
- 9 may be arrested by a police officer without a warrant.
