An Act relative to jury disqualifications.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

1           Section 4 of chapter 234A of the General Laws, as appearing in the 2012 Official Edition,  
2 is hereby amended by adding the following paragraph:-

3           9. Such person is legally blind and indicates on the juror confirmation form an election  
4 not to perform juror service. For purposes of this section “legally blind” shall mean a condition  
5 associated with a finding by a physician or optometrist that a person has a visual acuity of 20/200  
6 or less with correction in the better eye, or has a peripheral visual field of 10 degrees radius or  
7 less regardless of visual acuity.
