**In the One Hundred and Eighty-Ninth General Court
(2015-2016)**

An Act relative to residency.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 Section 99A, of Chapter 41 of the General Laws as appearing in the 2006 Official Edition
2 is hereby amended by adding after the word “agreement” in line 18, the words “provided further
3 that members of a regular police or fire department appointed subsequent to the adoption of such
4 local ordinance, by-law or collective bargaining agreement shall be bound by such collective
5 bargaining agreement, ordinance, or by-law for a period not to exceed five years.”
