In the One Hundred and Eighty-Ninth General Court (2015-2016)

An Act to amend Chapter 60A Section 1 of the Massachusetts General Laws.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

SECTION 1. Chapter 60A Section 1 of the Massachusetts General Laws is hereby

amended by adding the following paragraph after paragraph 8:

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The excise imposed by this section shall not apply to a motor vehicle owned and

registered by a citizen over the age of 65 whose annual income is at or below the federal poverty

guideline. This exemption shall apply to not more than one motor vehicle owned and registered

for the personal, noncommercial use of such senior citizen. After the assessors have allowed an

exemption under this paragraph no further evidence of the existence of the facts required by this

paragraph shall be required in any subsequent year in the city or town in which the exemption

has been so allowed; provided, however, that the assessors may refuse to allow an exemption in

any subsequent year if they become aware that the senior citizen did not satisfy all of the

requisites of this section at the time the exemption was first granted.
