- WHEREAS, the economic competitiveness of the United States and Massachusetts in the
- 2 global economy, requires a well-educated workforce;
- WHEREAS, students in Massachusetts currently average over \$29,000 upon graduation,

- 6 significantly hinders their ability to participate in the local economy;
- 8 WHEREAS, current and future young people in Massachusetts should have the same
- 9 opportunity offered to those who went to college in previous generations, including the ability to
- attend state colleges and universities without taking on overly burdensome debt;

12	WHEREAS, in 2016, higher education is more important than ever because it is an
13	essential step to entering and remaining in the middle class;

15	WHEREAS, because of the importance of higher education, the Federal and State
16	governments should expand the opportunity to pursue and attain higher education to more people
17	than had that opportunity in the past;

19	WHEREAS, public investment in higher education pays off, as evidenced by the fact the
20	G.I. Bill resulted in a 7-to-1 return on investment for our national economy and that workers with
21	college degrees earn more money, pay more taxes, and rely less on government services;

23	WHEREAS, student loan debt saddles the very students who most depend on a college
24	degree to level the economic playing field with a burden that constrains career choices and hurts
25	the credit rating of students, prevents people from fully participating in the economy by
26	purchasing goods and services. and threatens essential milestones of the American dream -
27	including the purchase of a home or car, starting a family, and saving for retirement; and

29	WHEREAS, a national goal of debt-free college would include significant federal aid to
30	states, including Massachusetts;

38	having no deb	t upon graduation from any public institutions of higher education;

41	in higher educ	eation and bring down costs for students;

43	3.	Increases aid to students to help them cover the total cost of college attendance
44	without taking	g on debt;
45	4.	Encourages innovation by States and institutions of higher education to increase
46	efficiency, lov	ver costs, and enable speedy and less-costly degree completion; and
47	5.	Reduces the burden of existing student loan debt.
