**In the One Hundred and Eighty-Ninth General Court
(2015-2016)**

An Act relative to protecting the health and safety of elders with hoarding disorder.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. Section 14 of Chapter 19A of the General Laws, as so appearing, is hereby
2 amended by striking out the first paragraph and inserting in place thereof the following
3 paragraph:

4 “Abuse”, an Act or omission which results in serious physical or emotional injury to an
5 elderly person or financial exploitation of an elderly person; or the failure, inability or resistance
6 of an elderly person to provide for him one or more of the necessities essential for safety,
7 physical and emotional well-being without which the elderly person would be unable to safely
8 remain in the community. The term includes compulsive hoarding, which is characterized by the
9 acquisition and retention of large quantities of items and materials, resulting in an extensively
10 cluttered living space that substantially impedes the performance of essential self-care tasks or

11 threatens the health and safety of the resident. Hoarding is often characterized by a lack of
12 insight into the health/safety risks caused by the hoarding. No person shall be considered to be
13 abused or neglected for the sole reason that such person is being furnished or relies upon
14 treatment in accordance with the tenets and teachings of a church or religious denomination by a
15 duly accredited practitioner thereof.
