**In the One Hundred and Ninetieth General Court
(2017-2018)**

An Act relative to the protection of children.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. Chapter 265 of the General Laws, as appearing in the 2014 Official Edition,
2 is hereby amended by adding to the end thereof the following section:--

3 Section 130. Failure to Notify Law Enforcement of Missing or Deceased Child

4 For the purposes of this section, the following words shall have the following meanings:--

5 “Person having care and custody”, a parent, guardian, employee of a home or institution
6 or any other person with equivalent supervision or care of a child, whether the supervision is
7 temporary or permanent.

8 “Child”, any person under 14 years of age.

9 "Law enforcement authority", any police department in the commonwealth or any of its
10 political subdivisions.

11 "Missing child or children", any person under the age of 14 years missing from his
12 normal and ordinary place of residence or last known whereabouts and whose whereabouts
13 cannot be determined by the person having care and custody of such child.

14 Whoever, having care and custody of a child, fails to notify a law enforcement authority
15 or emergency medical personnel of the death of such child, accidental or otherwise, within 2
16 hours of the discovery of such known death and (i) intends to mislead a public official, (ii)
17 intends to impede any investigation, or (iii) causes an investigation to be impeded, shall be
18 punished by a term of imprisonment in the state prison for not more than 10 years or
19 imprisonment in the house of correction for not more than 2 ½ years.

20 Whoever, having care and custody of a child, finds the child missing and fails to notify a
21 law enforcement authority of the missing child within 48 hours and (i) intends to mislead a
22 public official, (ii) intends to impede an investigation, or (iii) causes an investigation to be
23 impeded, shall be punished by a term of imprisonment in the state prison for not more than 10
24 years or imprisonment in the house of correction for not more than 2 ½ years.

25 SECTION 2. Section 13J of chapter 265 of the General Laws, as appearing in the 2014
26 Official Edition, is hereby amended by striking out, on line 32, the words "two and one-half
27 years" and inserting in place thereof the following words:- 10 years

28 ;and further, by striking out, on line 39, the words "five years" and inserting in place
29 thereof the following:- 15 years

30 ;and further, by striking out, on line 40, the words “two and one-half years” and inserting
31 in the place thereof the following:- 10 years.
