Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 Section 16 of Chapter 19A of the general laws is hereby amended by adding the
2 following section:

4 (f) The department shall require that all designated local agencies of the department
5 provide training to their protective services caseworkers specifically focused on recognizing the
6 signs and symptoms of cognitive impairments, including Alzheimer’s disease, and understanding
7 how cognitive impairment may affect screening, investigation, and service planning.
