By Mr. Donnelly, a petition (accompanied by bill, Senate, No. 1091) of Kenneth J. Donnelly, Jason M. Lewis, Kenneth I. Gordon, Barbara A. L'Italien and other members of the General Court for legislation to establish a restoration center in Middlesex County. Mental Health, Substance Use and Recovery.

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the One Hundred and Ninetieth General Court (2017-2018)

An Act establishing a restoration center in Middlesex County.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. There shall be a restoration center commission, hereinafter referred to as the 2 commission, within Middlesex County to plan and implement a county restoration center and 3 program for the purposes of diverting persons suffering from mental illness or substance use 4 disorder who interact with law enforcement or the court system during a pre-arrest investigation 5 or the pre-adjudication process from lock-up facilities and hospital emergency departments to 6 appropriate treatment. 7 The commission shall consist of 15 members: the Middlesex County sheriff, or a 8 designee; the Middlesex district attorney, or a designee; a member of the National Alliance for 9 Mental Illness Massachusetts; 2 representatives, appointed by the Middlesex County Chiefs 10 Association, from police departments within Middlesex County that have received critical 11 incident training or have established a local jail diversion program; a member of the senate 12 appointed by the senate president; a member of the house of representatives appointed by the

13 speaker of the house; a representative from the department of mental health with knowledge of 14 sequential intercept mapping and forensic services; a representative from the department of 15 public health with knowledge of sequential intercept mapping and forensic services; a 16 representative from a local community provider that delivers behavioral health services; a 17 representative from the trial courts with specialty court experience; a representative from the 18 executive office of public safety and security; a representative from MassHealth with knowledge 19 of insurance vehicles, including Medicaid; a representative from the office of the commissioner 20 of probation within Middlesex County; a representative from the parole board with knowledge of 21 establishing methodologies and analyzing metrics for program fidelity; and a representative from 22 the committee for public counsel services. The commission shall hold its first meeting no later 23 than 30 days after the effective date of this act.

24 The commission shall develop and implement a 3-year plan to build a restoration center 25 in Middlesex County. In the first year, the commission shall: (1) perform an examination of 26 national best practices including, but not limited to, the Bexar County model, which has received 27 national recognition from the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration for 28 its success in diverting individuals with behavioral health issues away from the criminal justice 29 system and into appropriate treatment; and (2) review the current capacity of the county to 30 provide behavioral health services to individuals suffering from mental illness or substance use 31 disorder who interact with law enforcement or the court system and the barriers they face to 32 accessing treatment. In the second year, the commission shall develop a jail diversion program 33 and an initial pilot focused on providing integrated community-based services from a centralized 34 location and perform an analysis of potential costs and cost savings. In the third year, the 35 commission shall develop a restoration center and secure funding for a subsequent 2-year period.

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36 Within 1 year the commission shall submit its findings and recommendations for a 37 restoration center, together with drafts of legislation necessary to carry out those 38 recommendations, including a report on the current capacity to provide behavioral health 39 services to individuals suffering from mental illness or substance use disorder, which shall 40 include, but shall not be limited to, the type of services pre- and post-release, location of 41 services, type of patients served, and barriers to diverting individuals away from the criminal 42 justice system and into treatment. Within 2 years the commission shall report on the outcome of 43 the pilot programs and provide a full implementation plan for a restoration center, including but 44 not limited to: deliverables, barriers to implementation, and costs. This report shall be submitted 45 to the house and senate committees on ways and means, the joint committee on mental health and substance abuse, the executive office of public safety and security, the executive office of 46 47 health and human services and the governor. The commission shall thereafter produce an annual 48 report, which shall include, but not be limited to: list of services and programs, populations 49 served, and financial information. 50 SECTION 2. SECTION 2. Chapter 29 of the General Laws is hereby amended by 51 inserting after section 2VVVV the following section:-52 Section 2WWWW. Criminal Justice and Community Support Trust Fund. 53 (a) There is hereby established and set up on the books of the commonwealth a separate 54 fund to be known as the Criminal Justice and Community Support Trust Fund, hereinafter called 55 the fund. The fund shall be administered by the executive office of public safety and security, in 56 consultation with the department of mental health, which shall contract with county restoration

57 centers and the center of excellence in community policing and behavioral health, established in

58 section 18L1/2 of chapter 6A, to administer the fund. There shall be credited to the fund any 59 appropriations, grants, gifts or other monies authorized by the general court or other parties and 60 specifically designated to be credited to the fund. The objectives of the fund shall include, but 61 shall not be limited to: supporting jail diversion programs for persons suffering from a mental 62 illness or substance use disorder who interact with law enforcement or the court system during a 63 pre-arrest investigation or the pre-adjudication process in order to divert individuals from lockup 64 facilities and hospital emergency departments to appropriate treatment; developing and providing 65 training for state and municipal law enforcement in evidence-based mental health and substance 66 use crisis response; creating patient-focused ongoing community services for individuals who are 67 frequent users of emergency departments and suffer from serious and persistent mental illness; 68 and providing funding for multi-year restoration center grants for the purpose of planning and 69 implementing a restoration center within a county in the commonwealth.

(b) Monies deposited in the fund that are unexpended at the end of the fiscal year shall
not revert to the General Fund and shall be available for expenditure in the subsequent year.

(c) The fund may apply for and accept subventions, grants, loans, advances and
contributions from any source of money, property, labor or other things of value to be held, used
and applied in furtherance of this section.

(d) The executive office of public safety and security shall, on or before March 1, file a
report to the joint committee on mental health and substance abuse, the joint committee on public
safety and homeland security, and the senate and house committees on ways and means detailing
the fund's activities.

79 SECTION 3. This act shall take effect upon its passage.

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
