The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the One Hundred and Ninetieth General Court (2017-2018)

An Act relative to revenue, information, and accountability.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 The Secretary for Administration and Finance shall provide a short summary each year to 2 be mailed to Massachusetts resident taxpayers by March 15, which reports the total amount of 3 income tax paid to the federal government in the prior year, together with the per cent of those 4 dollars allocated in the prior year's Congressional discretionary budget to housing, education, 5 healthcare, public transit, biomedical research, veterans services, food stamps and assistance, 6 environmental protection, and defense spending including nuclear weapons. The report shall also 7 include the estimated increase or decrease in federal funds being returned to Massachusetts in the 8 various categories above, by comparing the current Congressional discretionary budget 9 authorization with the prior year's budget appropriations. The report shall include easy to read 10 pie chart or bar graph form use the budget numbers reported by the Congressional Budget Office 11 of the federal government. The report shall also remind taxpayers that Medicare and Social 12 Security programs are financed as separate trust funds, not through income taxes.

13 The secretary may acquire the information required under this section from any 14 nonpartisan, third-party organization that regularly compiles such data; provided further, the 15 secretary may enter into an agreement with such an organization to produce the report on the 16 secretary's behalf.
