By Mr. Eldridge, a petition (accompanied by bill, Senate, No. 425) of James B. Eldridge, Carolyn C. Dykema, Carmine L. Gentile, Daniel J. Ryan and other members of the General Court for legislation relative to drought management. Environment, Natural Resources and Agriculture.

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

**In the One Hundred and Ninetieth General Court
(2017-2018)**

An Act relative to drought management.

Whereas, The deferred operation of this act would tend to defeat its purpose, which is to forthwith improve the commonwealth’s preparedness and response to drought, therefore, it is hereby declared to be an emergency law, necessary for the immediate preservation of the public convenience.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 Chapter 21A of the General Laws, as appearing in the 2014 Official Edition, is hereby
2 amended by inserting after section 2A the following section:-

3 Section 2B. (a) There shall be established within the office the drought management task
4 force. The secretary and the director of the Massachusetts emergency management agency shall
5 appoint the following parties to the task force: (1) officials from state agencies and professional
6 organizations with responsibility for areas likely to be affected by drought conditions; (2)
7 representatives of agencies that provide data used to assess drought conditions or that have the
8 ability to respond to drought conditions; and (3) public health and safety and environmental
9 professionals, and may invite officials from federal agencies to participate. The secretary and the

10 director shall have joint responsibility for coordinating the task force. The task force shall meet
11 at least quarterly, but it shall meet at least monthly during drought. The task force shall be staffed
12 by a director appointed by the secretary.

13 (b) Within 6 months, the task force shall adopt, and update thereafter as needed, a revised
14 drought management plan that addresses preparedness, and defines drought indices, action levels
15 with appropriate levels of response, communication, and coordination based on drought severity.
16 The drought management plan shall protect public health and safety and the environment. Some
17 drought management plan actions may be triggered by particular drought indices and shall not
18 require a majority of the indices at a drought level to be reached.

19 (c) The task force shall assist in collecting and assessing technical information,
20 facilitating coordination and communication among task force members, agencies and the public,
21 and provide recommendations to the secretary, the secretary of public safety and security and the
22 governor on the level of drought and responses thereto. The task force shall also make
23 recommendations for the end of drought, or reduction of the drought level, focusing on the key
24 drought indicators of precipitation, groundwater levels and streamflow.

25 (d) The secretary may order water conservation measures, including limits on
26 nonessential outdoor water use, based on the severity of drought in drought regions to protect
27 public health, safety or the environment. Such water conservation measures by the secretary shall
28 apply uniformly to all water users within a drought region.

29 (e) Notwithstanding section 27C of chapter 29 or any ordinance, by-law, rule or
30 regulation to the contrary, cities and towns shall enforce water conservation restrictions issued by
31 the secretary to the fullest extent permitted by law.
