Transformative Development Initiative [TDI] Cowork Annual Report FY16

As one component of MassDevelopment's Transformative Development Initiative, the TDI Cowork program seeks to foster innovation and creative-economy clusters by providing grants to for-profit and nonprofit entities that own, sponsor, or operate collaborative workspaces. These spaces often feature open floor plans and shared tools or equipment with an emphasis on common spaces, and provide working environments that inspire collaboration among and between those working in the innovation and creative economy. These spaces are unique and reflect the communities that build them, but they take on a variety of particular 'types': co-working shared offices, incubators/accelerators, makerspaces, shared commercial kitchens, and/or hybrids of any or all of these.

With this pilot program from FY14 through FY16, MassDevelopment provided grants for building improvements, equipment acquisition, and feasibility studies for collaborative workspaces. This grant program supports both the establishment of new spaces and the expansion of existing ones. MassDevelopment disbursed these funds either as early-stage 'Seed Grants' or larger 'Fit-Out Grants.'

Seed Grants:

Seed Grants can be used for third-party costs of feasibility studies, design work, construction estimates, marketing, and the leasing of temporary space to incubate and grow a collaborative workspace before it is ready to move into permanent space.

Fit-Out Grants:

Fit-Out Grants can be used for labor and materials for building improvements including interior fit-out costs, soft costs, and the purchase of equipment.

MassDevelopment released the initial RFP for the TDI Cowork program in August 2014, and in December 2015 followed up with a subsequent RFP for spaces that had previously applied. Since the inception of the program and through June 30, 2016, MassDevelopment has approved 24 grants – thirteen (13) Fit-Out grants and eleven (11) Seed grants totaling \$1,449,800, which grant recipients have matched in a 1:1 ratio. During FY16, the Agency approved five (5) Seed Grants and eight (8) Fit-Out grants for a total fiscal year commitment of \$462,000.

MassDevelopment has been a part of the evolution of these spaces for a number of years beginning with a "Maker Spaces" report in 2013 and its launch of the Transformative Development Initiative in 2014. MassDevelopment's management of these grant awards, research into best practices, and ongoing relationship with the grantees, applicants, and other ecosystem stakeholders, gives the agency an in-depth view into the needs of spaces and communities throughout the Commonwealth. MassDevelopment has begun preliminary third-party facilitated technical assistance evaluations with select spaces and continues to monitor the progress at each space.

In November 2015, MassDevelopment partnered with the Executive Office of Housing and Economic Development (EOHED) on a needs-assessment survey of emerging and existing collaborative workspaces in the Commonwealth to understand the broader needs of the community within Massachusetts. The survey results showed there are at least 104 collaborative spaces starting or growing across the Commonwealth with more than twenty percent of the respondents identifying as arts-related spaces. In order to develop to their full potential, these spaces reported a total need of approximately \$9-11 million in capital investment and \$2-3 million in operating costs ranging from equipment to staff resources.

MassDevelopment collects data from grantees to evaluate progress. As reported by the various projects that were required/able to report (based upon closing dates), the 19 unique spaces that make up the 24 approvals occupy 140,985 square feet of real estate, have secured 167 new members/member companies, and hosted 202 events, meetings, and classes. Spaces reported hosting five to seven started or accelerated businesses during this reporting period.

Overview of Awarded Projects

Successful TDI Cowork grant recipients met the key criteria, outlined in a Request for Proposals:

- Location in a central, visible area supported by other active uses/amenities that support the growth of the community of users;
- Demonstrable community of existing and potential users that their space serves or would serve:
- Provide sufficient collaborative working areas and programming to promote interaction among members;
- Through design of the space and operations, having the potential to
 - o foster the growth of the emerging innovation and creative economy in the Gateway Cities, and
 - o enhance the stability/foundation of a growing community of entrepreneurs and enterprises, and
 - o spur new enterprises; and
- Facilitating the rehabilitation of an underused building in a Gateway City.

Four additional grants (two seed and two fit-out) were initially approved, but declined by the grantees before closing for a variety of reasons including the inability to commit the matching funds to the project and/or a shift in focus by the operator of the space.

Year-End Observations

- Grantee Status/Progress:
 - Most operational spaces connect their members to business growth or skill development events or resources.

- Membership growth was most successful with consistent and targeted marketing and outreach efforts by operators, with meet-ups and events driving new members into the spaces.
- Some spaces should focus more on a niche offering or strength as opposed to trying to be all things to all people.
- Closing dates that occurred either late in FY16 or early in FY17 affected reporting as grantees may not have commenced their project prior to the June 30 data collection.

• Program Administration:

- Provide more direct technical assistance with a focus on budget and business plan construction especially for Seed grantees.
- Increase follow-up with grantees and applicants, connect them to larger resources through workshops and technical assistance, and create a community between and among collaborative workspace operators.
- Provide additional third-party technical assistance in the form of needs assessments to select start-up spaces.

• Additional Needs of Cowork Spaces:

- Securing operational money for additional staffing/programming was an obstacle to growth.
- Expense associated with building code compliance was a common concern raised by the grantees.
- Some spaces will require a more defined focus to attract the right community of users and to ensure that the use of the space maximizes return to ensure sustainability.
- Reassessing mission and vision statements, as well as organizational structure, on a periodic basis will benefit the more nascent spaces as they mature.
- Spaces should constantly assess equipment usage and membership trends to make sure that they are providing sufficient access to the right equipment demanded by paying members.

Next Steps

At the conclusion of FY16, and after a successful pilot round through the TDI Cowork program, MassDevelopment and EOHED are on the verge of creating and launching a more permanent multiyear effort to address the needs of communities, creatives, and entrepreneurs with a broader program to support collaborative workspaces by expanding the offerings beyond Gateway Cities. These investments will continue through the projected recapitalization of the TDI Co-Work program in Gateway Cities, and in all cities and towns in Massachusetts through the creation of the Innovation Infrastructure Program. As combined, the programs will simply be known as the "Collaborative Workspace Program."
