An Act allowing an exemption to the prohibition on gifts to public employees.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 Section 3 of chapter 268A of the General Laws, as appearing in the 2014 Official Edition,
2 is hereby amended by striking out subsection (f) and inserting in place thereof the following
3 subsection:-

4 (f) The state ethics commission shall adopt regulations: (i) defining "substantial value,";
5 provided, however, that "substantial value" shall not be less than \$50; (ii) establishing exclusions
6 for ceremonial gifts; (iii) establishing exclusions for gifts given solely because of family or
7 friendship; (iv) establishing an one-time exemption within a calendar year for public employees
8 to accept a gift larger than \$50, subject to the decision of the state ethics commission pursuant to
9 rules promulgated for permissible one-time exemptions; and (v) establishing additional

- 10 exclusions for other situations that do not present a genuine risk of a conflict or the appearance
- 11 of a conflict of interest.
