To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives,

To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives:

I am filing for your consideration a bill entitled "An Act Making Appropriations for Fiscal Year 2021 to Provide for Supplementing Certain Existing Appropriations and for Certain Other Activities and Projects," recommending the appropriation of \$107.4 million in fiscal year 2021 (FY21).

Many of the Commonwealth's small businesses, and notably those with diverse ownership, are experiencing prolonged challenges in accessing capital, which are compounded by severe revenue loss. The Municipal Police Training Committee and the proposed Peace Officer Standards and Training (POST) Commission both need operating funds. Interruptions in schools across the Commonwealth have deeply disrupted learning in ways that could persist for years if left unaddressed.

Despite the state's own fiscal pressures, the need for small business support cannot be understated. The revised budget proposal I submitted in October included over \$100 million in additional funding for an economic recovery and small business relief plan, with a focus on supporting small businesses in underserved markets, minority-owned, women-owned, and veteran-owned businesses, and those that have not yet received federal aid. While the budget enacted by the Legislature included additional economic development assistance, it only funded about half of our proposal. I appreciate your support for additional resources for economic development. Given the hardships facing Main Street economies and diverse businesses across the Commonwealth, I ask again today for full funding in order to address the unique needs of Massachusetts small businesses.

Specifically, this bill includes \$46.4 million for new economic recovery planning and response programs through Mass Growth Capital Corp and \$1 million to bring traditional Small Business Technical Assistance grants to \$6 million. I recommend again the full \$4 million budget for Community Compact related programs, as strong municipal government practices contribute to the essential stability of Main Street businesses.

I am also recommending \$5 million to fund the start-up costs of the new POST Commission. Separate funding is necessary to provide the new POST Commission with operating funds while maintaining the necessary funding for the training mission served by the Municipal Police Training Committee

On the subject of schools, the Legislature appropriated \$53 million for one-time grants to the K-12 system intended to maintain and increase educational quality during the pandemic. While I agree with the intention, distributing the money by formula misses the opportunity to prioritize more targeted measures, especially for low-income districts. These could include intensive instructional time during school vacations, early literacy supports, remote learning support services, and individual tutoring. Extra support may be needed for very young children, particularly those with special educational needs, or who have fallen behind in reading, as well as teenagers who are taking the MCAS exam and preparing to move on to college. Repurposing these funds will also support the expansion of district-run summer schools, community-based learning pods, and accelerate the development of expanded online resources.

This legislation recommends \$53 million to address those needs.

I recognize that I am filing this bill at the very end of the legislative session. If the Legislature is unable to act before the end of session, we will continue to pursue this funding as these critical needs are not going away. Sufficient revenues are estimated to be available to finance these appropriations. I urge you to enact this legislation promptly.

In the One Hundred and Ninety-First General Court (2019-2020)

An Act making appropriations for fiscal year 2021 to provide for supplementing certain existing appropriations and for certain other activities and projects.

Whereas, The deferred operation of this act would tend to defeat its purposes, which are forthwith to make supplemental appropriations for fiscal year 2021 and to make certain changes in law, each of which is immediately necessary to carry out those appropriations or to accomplish other important public purposes, therefore it is hereby declared to be an emergency law, necessary for the immediate preservation of the public convenience.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1	SECTION 1. To provide for supplementing certain items in the general appropriation act
2	and other appropriation acts for fiscal year 2021, the sums set forth in section 2 are hereby
3	appropriated from the General Fund unless specifically designated otherwise in this act or in
4	those appropriation acts, for the several purposes and subject to the conditions specified in this
5	act or in those appropriation acts, and subject to the laws regulating the disbursement of public
6	funds for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2021. These sums shall be in addition to any amounts
7	previously appropriated and made available for the purposes of those items. These sums shall be
8	made available until June 30, 2022, except as otherwise stated.
