The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the One Hundred and Ninety-First General Court (2019-2020)

An Act concerning feminine hygiene products in schools.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1	Section 1. Chapter 71 of the Massachusetts General Laws is hereby amended by adding
2	at the end thereof the following section 68A:
3	Section 2. For purposes of this section, "feminine hygiene products" means tampons and
4	sanitary napkins for use in connection with the menstrual cycle.
5	Section 3. All elementary and secondary public schools in the Commonwealth serving
6	students in any grade from grade six through grade twelve shall provide feminine hygiene
7	products in the restrooms of such school building or buildings. Such products shall be provided
8	at no charge to students. Such amount may be adjusted from time to time based on utilization.
9	School districts shall work to ensure that such products shall be available in a convenient manner
10	that does not stigmatize any student seeking such product.
11	Section 4. This act shall take effect on August 1, 2020.
