The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the One Hundred and Ninety-First General Court (2019-2020)

An Act relative to emergency response in an active shooter or hostile event situation.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1	SECTION 1. Chapter 6A of the General Laws is hereby amended by inserting after
2	section 18V the following section:-
3	Section 18W. Active Shooter/Hostile Events Response (ASHER) Program:
4	(a) Definitions
5	Active Shooter/Hostile Events Response (ASHER) Program; A community-based
6	approach to preparedness, mitigation, response, and recovery from an ASHER incident,
7	including public and private partnerships, emergency management, the medical community,
8	emergency responders, and the public.
9	Department; The Executive Office of Public Safety and Security
10	Secretary; The Secretary of Public Safety and Security

(b) The department shall adopt the National Fire Protection Association's NFPA 3000
Standard as the standard guideline for active shooter or hostile event situations in the
Commonwealth.

(c) The department, in conjunction with state, county, municipal, and regional law
enforcement, fire services, emergency medical services, and emergency response agencies,
develop and implement standard training requirements to achieve an integrated preparedness,
response, and recovery for active shooter or hostile event situations.

18 (d) There shall be within the department an Active Shooter or Hostile Event Situation 19 (ASHER) Executive Council, consisting of the Secretary or their designee; Fire Marshall or their 20 designee; the Colonel of the State Police or their designee, a medical director appointed by the 21 OEMS medical director; the director of the office of preparedness and emergency management 22 at the department of public health, or a designee; and 10 members appointed by the Secretary, or 23 their designee, as follows: 1 each from the Professional Fire Fighters of Massachusetts, the 24 Massachusetts Ambulance Association, the Fire Chiefs Association of Massachusetts, the 25 International Association of EMTs and Paramedics, the Massachusetts Chiefs of Police, the 26 Massachusetts Coalition of Police, the State Police Association of Massachusetts, a 27 representative of the state 911 department and 2 members at large. The Secretary shall appoint 28 the chair of the executive council. Each appointed member of the executive council shall serve a 29 term of 3 years, or until a successor is appointed and qualified. At least one-half of the total 30 appointed members of executive council shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of 31 business. Appointees shall serve without compensation.

32	(e) The executive council shall meet, at a minimum, once quarterly, and shall assist in
33	coordinating the efforts of all persons and agencies in the state concerned with the emergency
34	response in an active shooter or hostile event situation, and shall render advice on the
35	development of the emergency response in an active shooter or hostile event situation. The
36	executive council, in consultation with the department, shall submit an annual report to the
37	Secretary and to the Clerks of the House of Representatives and Senate, on or before June 30.
38	(f) It shall be the duty of the department to plan, guide, assist, coordinate and regulate the
39	development of an emergency response plan in an active shooter or hostile event situation.
40	(g) The department shall be the lead state agency for development and recommendations
41	on emergency response to an active shooter or hostile event situation in the Commonwealth. The
42	department shall have the authority to:
43	(1) direct and coordinate a program for planning, developing, maintaining, expanding,
44	improving and upgrading emergency response in an active shooter or hostile event situation.
45	(2) establish minimum standards and criteria for all elements of emergency response in
46	an active shooter or hostile event situation, taking into consideration relevant standards and
47	criteria developed or adopted by nationally recognized agencies or organizations, and the
48	recommendations of interested parties.
49	(3) define and approve the minimum standards for training programs on emergency
50	response in an active shooter or hostile event situation in this state.
