The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

**In the One Hundred and Ninety-First General Court
(2019-2020)**

An Act establishing a behavioral health workforce commission.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 There shall be a behavioral health workforce commission to study workforce needs of the
2 behavioral health system in the commonwealth and to identify reasons for behavioral health
3 workforce shortages, including shortages in both inpatient and community-based settings.

4 The commission shall issue a report that shall include, but not be limited to, a review of
5 and recommendations regarding: 1) the expansion of and funding mechanisms for loan
6 forgiveness and scholarship programs for all providers in the behavioral health field, regardless
7 of if they practice in a health professional shortage area; 2) the inclusion of behavioral health
8 curriculum earlier in medical, nursing, and other educational programs; 3) the limited numbers of
9 slots at associates and bachelors level registered nurse programs, and barriers limiting the
10 expansion of these programs; 4) the creation of programs to encourage registered nurses to work
11 in psychiatric settings, including the feasibility of establishing internships and fellowships in
12 psychiatric nursing; 5) increasing the number of psychiatric clinical sites for nursing students;

13 6)increasing training for behavioral health providers to treat severe mental illness and substance
14 use disorders; 7) the expansion of scope of practice for psychiatric nurse mental health clinical
15 specialists and psychiatric nurse practitioners to ease the shortage of psychiatrists in inpatient
16 settings by allowing all providers to work at the top of their license; and 8) the impact of
17 commercial and public behavioral health rates on the ability to recruit and retain behavioral
18 health providers.

19 The commission shall consist of 24 members: the secretary of health and human services
20 or a designee, who shall serve as chair, the commissioner of mental health or a designee, the
21 commissioner of public health or a designee, the director of the office of Medicaid or a designee,
22 the commissioner of the department of higher education or a designee, and 1 representative from
23 each of the following organizations: the Massachusetts Psychiatric Society, the Massachusetts
24 Medical Society, the Massachusetts Association of Advanced Practice Psychiatric Nurses, the
25 Massachusetts chapter of the National Association of Social Workers, the Massachusetts
26 Psychological Association, the Massachusetts Society of Addiction Medicine, the American
27 Nurses Association Massachusetts, the Organization of Nurse Leaders, the Massachusetts
28 Association of Advanced Practice Psychiatric Nurses, the Massachusetts Health and Hospital
29 Association, the Association of Behavioral Healthcare, the Massachusetts Association of
30 Behavioral Health Systems, the Massachusetts League of Community Health Centers, the
31 Massachusetts Organization for Addiction Recovery, the Massachusetts Association for Mental
32 Health, the National Alliance on Mental Illness of Massachusetts, the Children’s Mental Health
33 Campaign, the Massachusetts Association of Health Plans, and the Blue Cross Blue Shield of
34 Massachusetts.

35 The commission shall file a report on its findings and recommendations, together with
36 any recommendations for legislation, with the clerks of the house of representatives and the
37 senate no later than 1 year from the effective date of this act.
