1           SECTION 1. To provide for a program of capital investments for public safety,  
2 governmental infrastructure, information technology and data and cyber-security improvements  
3 to various state programs, services, agencies, institutions and properties and to fund technology  
4 infrastructure, the sums set forth in this act, for the several purposes and subject to the conditions  
5 specified in this act, are hereby made available, subject to the laws regulating the disbursement  
6 of public funds, which sums shall be in addition to any other amounts previously appropriated  
7 for these purposes; provided, that the amounts specified for a particular project may be adjusted  
8 in order to facilitate projects authorized in this act.

10           EXECUTIVE OFFICE OF TECHNOLOGY SERVICES AND SECURITY

12           1790-3006 For costs associated with initiatives, projects and expenditures to make  
13 improvements to the quality, consistency, efficiency and delivery of any service or program for  
14 the benefit of the public and the interactions between residents and state agencies and  
15 instrumentalities of the commonwealth, including but not limited to, planning and studies, the  
16 preparation of plans and specifications, purchase, procurement, acquisition, licensing and

17 implementation of information technology, telecommunications and data-security-related  
18 equipment, hardware, software, systems, intellectual property and related projects for various  
19 state agencies of the commonwealth; provided, that for projects the secretary of administration  
20 and finance certifies to the comptroller directly or indirectly generate state revenue or budgetary  
21 savings, the comptroller shall transfer such revenue or budgetary savings to the state treasurer for  
22 payment of debt service related to those projects; and provided further, that any federal  
23 reimbursement received by a state agency in connection with projects funded from this item may  
24 be retained by the state agency or the executive office of technology services and security and  
25 expended for the purposes of the project, without further appropriation, in addition to the

46 instrumentalities of the commonwealth to mitigate, avoid or respond to risks to the security of  
47 the commonwealth’s technology and telecommunications infrastructure or operations; provided,  
48 that for projects the secretary of administration and finance certifies to the comptroller directly or  
49 indirectly generate state revenue or budgetary savings, the comptroller shall transfer such  
50 revenue or budgetary savings to the state treasurer for payment of debt service related to those  
51 projects; provided further, that not less than \$5,000,000 shall be provided to cybersecurity,  
52 software, hardware and infrastructure upgrades at community colleges; and provided further, that  
53 any federal reimbursement received by a state agency in connection with projects funded from  
54 this item may be retained by the state agency or the executive office of technology services and  
55 security and expended for the purposes of the project, without further appropriation, in addition  
56 to the amounts appropriated in this item.....\$140,000,000

57       1790-3009 For costs associated with planning and studies, the preparation of plans and  
58 specifications, purchase, procurement, acquisition, licensing and implementation of information  
59 technology, telecommunications and data-security-related equipment, hardware, software,  
60 systems, intellectual property and related projects for various state agencies of the  
61 commonwealth including, but not limited to, executing strategic initiatives, improving business  
62 intelligence and modernizing governmental functions; provided, that funds may be expended for

63 costs associated with the development, implementation and deployment of an online delivery  
64 system for unemployment insurance compensation benefits including, but not limited to, the  
65 awarding of contracts to consultants; provided further, that prior to the selection of consultants  
66 and prior to and during the development, implementation and deployment of the online delivery  
67 system, the secretary of labor and workforce development and the consultants after so chosen  
68 shall consult with a subcommittee within the state workforce development board established in  
69 section 7 of chapter 23H of the General Laws; provided further, that the subcommittee,  
70 consistent with representation on the state workforce development board established in said  
71 section 7 of said chapter 23H, shall include, but not be limited to, membership representing  
72 employers, including small business owners, labor organizations and community-based  
73 organizations that have demonstrated experience and expertise in addressing the employment,  
74 training or education needs of individuals facing barriers to employment or experience and  
75 expertise in addressing the employment, training or education needs of youth; provided further,  
76 that the subcommittee shall be representative of women, people of color, veterans and people  
77 with disabilities in proportion to these group's representation in the commonwealth's population,  
78 as well as diverse geographic areas of the commonwealth; provided further, that the  
79 subcommittee shall seek stakeholder input on the criteria utilized for the selection of the bid  
80 evaluation from low-wage unemployed workers, people with disabilities who use assistive  
81 technology, community-based organizations that advocate for people with limited proficiency in  
82 English, people of color, recipients of unemployment benefits and individuals with technological  
83 expertise in systems designed to maximize user accessibility and inclusiveness; provided further,  
84 that the subcommittee shall submit stakeholder input to the secretary on the criteria to be utilized  
85 for the selection of the bid evaluation; provided further, that the secretary and the subcommittee

86 shall meet quarterly; provided further, that the secretary shall submit quarterly reports on the  
87 progress of the development, implementation and deployment of an online delivery system for  
88 unemployment compensation benefits to the clerks of the house of representatives and the  
89 senate; provided further, that the last quarterly report of 2021 shall include a plan for the  
90 deployment of the online system and an update on the progress of the development of the online  
91 delivery system, including a demonstration of the design and access to the online system and  
92 alternate methods of access for individuals with barriers to access; provided further, that the  
93 design shall comply with federal and state requirements for unemployment delivery systems and  
94 standards for digital accessibility, including the most recent version of web accessibility  
95 standards; provided further, that within 90 days of the submission of the development plan, the  
96 secretary shall hold a public hearing and solicit testimony on the plan; provided further, that not  
97 later than 120 days before the online delivery system becomes available for public use, the  
98 secretary shall submit a final report on the development of the system to the clerks of the house  
99 and senate that shall include a summary of testimony received through the public hearing and a  
100 description of actions taken as a result of testimony received; provided further that after  
101 consultation with the subcommittee, the final report shall also set forth a process for user  
102 acceptance testing and for soliciting, accepting and resolving stakeholder feedback for continual  
103 improvement, including a public service announcement plan to keep all stakeholders informed  
104 about access and changes to the online delivery system; provided further, that for projects the  
105 secretary of administration and finance certifies to the comptroller directly or indirectly generate  
106 state revenue or budgetary savings, the comptroller shall transfer such revenue or budgetary  
107 savings to the state treasurer for payment of debt service related to those projects; and provided  
108 further, that any federal reimbursement received by a state agency in connection with projects

113 EXECUTIVE OFFICE OF EDUCATION

114 Department of Elementary and Secondary Education

115 1599-7064 For a competitive, matching grant program to be administered by the  
116 executive office of education and the department of elementary and secondary education, in  
117 consultation with the secretary of technology services and security, to assist public schools and  
118 districts in improving student instruction and assessment through the use of information  
119 technology; provided, that the program shall include assistance to public schools and districts to  
120 establish, enhance or expand remote learning environments; provided further, that funds may be  
121 used to reimburse costs incurred by public schools or districts establishing, enhancing or  
122 expanding remote learning environments in response to the state of emergency concerning the  
123 novel coronavirus outbreak declared by the governor on March 10, 2020; provided further, that  
124 grants shall be used to ensure fair and equitable access to technology across the commonwealth  
125 and to address the needs of vulnerable populations, including addressing barriers for students  
126 caused by disability, race or ethnicity, English learner status, having a primary home language  
127 other than English, homelessness, low-income status, or other factors that place students at-risk,  
128 including those in a gateway municipality, as defined in section 3A of chapter 23A of the  
129 General Laws; provided further, that the executive office of education and the department of  
130 elementary and secondary education, in consultation with the executive office of technology

131 services and security, shall determine the criteria used to evaluate applications for the matching  
132 grant program; provided further, that the criteria shall promote access to broadband to public  
133 schools and districts; and provided further, that such criteria shall include, but not be limited to,  
134 the commitment of the public school or district to improve the efficiency and productivity of  
135 education through the use of technology, to deliver statewide online assessments, to provide  
136 student access to individualized and rigorous digital learning experiences and to ensure that  
137 educators and administrators have the knowledge and skills to develop and implement digital  
138 learning curricula .....\$50,000,000

139 Department of Early Education and Care

140 3000-2020 For a grant program administered by the department of early education and  
141 care to assist licensed early education and care providers and after school programs with capital  
142 improvements necessary to meet the minimum health and safety requirements established by the  
143 department for approved reopening during the state of emergency concerning the 2019 novel  
144 coronavirus outbreak declared by the governor on March 10, 2020; provided, that the department  
145 shall determine a process for awarding grants to support capital improvements allowing early  
146 education and care providers and after school programs to open safely or to reimburse providers  
147 for prior capital improvements necessary to open safely; provided further, that the grant  
148 distribution process shall prioritize providers serving families receiving subsidized childcare  
149 through the department; provided further, that in determining a process for awarding grants, the  
150 department shall aim to support equitable geographic access to child care and shall align the  
151 availability of child care and after school programs with the needs of the workforce; provided  
152 further, that the services made available pursuant to such grants shall not be construed as a right  
153 or entitlement to the benefits financing for any individual or class of persons; provided further,



154 that no expenditure shall be made from this item without the prior approval of the secretary of  
155 administration and finance; and provided further, that eligibility shall be established by  
156 regulations promulgated by the department pursuant to chapter 30A of the General Laws for the  
157 implementation, administration and enforcement of this item.....\$25,000,000

158 Department of Higher Education

159 7066-6829 For initiatives to improve the safety and security of public institutions of  
160 higher education, to be administered in coordination with the executive office of education and  
161 the executive office of public safety and security; provided, that funding may be used for multi-  
162 year grants to public institutions of higher education for school security and communications  
163 upgrades; provided further, that funding may be used to provide training for campus public  
164 safety officials; provided further, that funding may be used to provide upgrades of security  
165 cameras, door locks, active shooter detection systems, emergency communication systems,  
166 campus lighting and emergency call boxes; and provided further, that not less than \$10,000,000  
167 shall be provided to community colleges in commonwealth.....\$30,000,000

178 1100-2512 For a grant program to cities, towns, regional organizations whose  
179 membership is exclusively composed of municipal governments or municipal redevelopment  
180 authorities or agencies or similar governmental development agencies to provide funding for  
181 capital purposes, including, but not limited to, planning and studies, preparation of plans and  
182 specifications, site assembly and preparation, dispositions, acquisitions, repairs, renovations,  
183 improvements, construction, demolition, remediation, modernization and reconstruction of  
184 facilities, infrastructure, equipment and other capital assets, technical assistance, information  
185 technology equipment and infrastructure and for costs associated with improving accessibility of

194 Division of Capital Asset Management and Maintenance

195           1102-2020 For costs associated with planning and studies, dispositions, acquisition of  
196 land and buildings and interests therein by purchase, prepayment of lease for a term that exceeds  
197 the useful life of the facility, gift or other transfer or by eminent domain pursuant to chapter 79  
198 of the General Laws, for the preparation of plans and specifications, disparity studies, repairs,  
199 construction, renovations, improvements, asset management, accessibility improvements,  
200 demolition, disposition and remediation of state-owned and former county facilities and grounds  
201 and for costs associated with repair and maintenance of buildings, building systems and  
202 equipment at various facilities of the commonwealth; provided, that any federal reimbursement  
203 received by a state agency in connection with projects funded from this item may be retained by  
204 the executive office for administration and finance and expended for the purposes of the project,  
205 without further appropriation, in addition to the amounts appropriated in this item; provided  
206 further, that all maintenance and repair work funded in this item shall be listed in the capital asset

213 supervision process pursuant to section 5 of chapter 7C of the General Laws; and provided  
214 further, that funds so transferred shall be distributed based on the severity of the need that the  
215 repair is intended to address and other criteria developed by the division of capital asset  
216 management and maintenance, in consultation with the secretary of administration and

219 land and buildings and interests therein by purchase, prepayment of lease for a term that exceeds

221 of the General Laws, for the preparation of plans and specifications, repairs, construction,  
222 renovations, improvements, modernization, construction, reconstruction, furnishing, equipping,

233 executive office for administration and finance and expended for the purposes of the project,  
234 without further appropriation, in addition to the amounts appropriated in this item...\$100,000,000

235           8000-2025 For costs associated with planning and studies, dispositions, acquisition of  
236 land and buildings and interests therein by purchase, prepayment of lease for a term that exceeds  
237 the useful life of the facility, gift or other transfer or by eminent domain pursuant to chapter 79  
238 of the General Laws, for the preparation of plans and specifications, repairs, construction,  
239 renovations, improvements, remediation, rehabilitation, modernization and demolition for public  
240 safety and security facilities, all as the commissioner of capital asset management and

253           1107-2410 For state financial assistance in the form of grants to cities and towns for  
254 modifications to governmental infrastructure to enhance accessibility; provided, that projects  
255 may include, but shall not be limited to, projects providing for renovation, remodeling,  
256 reconstruction, redevelopment and hazardous material abatement, including asbestos and lead

274 executive office of housing and economic development; provided further, that the executive  
275 office, in developing the grant program and its award criteria, shall take into consideration  
276 socially and economically disadvantaged individuals, including, but not limited to, individuals  
277 who have been subjected to racial or ethnic prejudice or cultural bias because of their identity as  
278 a member of a group without regard to their individual qualities; provided further, that  
279 prioritization in awarding grants shall be given to, but not limited to: (i) municipalities with  
280 higher proportions of said socially and economically disadvantaged individuals; (ii) community

307 equipment; provided, that eligible fire safety equipment under this program shall include, but not  
308 be limited to, washer or dryer units, turnout gear, hand-held power lights, communication  
309 devices, personal alarm safety systems, self-contained breathing apparatus, fit test equipment, air  
310 packs, tanks, compressors, thermal imaging devices and computerized personnel accountability

335 projected infrastructure needs for farms, retailers, fisheries, food system businesses and food  
336 distribution channels including, but not limited to, food banks, farm stands, food hubs, food  
337 retailers, elder services and community supported agriculture farms, while taking into account  
338 the unique needs of rural and urban areas and gateway municipalities as defined in section 3A of  
339 chapter 23A of the General Laws, in order to adapt to the disruptions caused as a result of the  
340 outbreak of the 2019 novel coronavirus, also known as COVID-19, to provide greater access to  
341 local food in ways that support social-distancing recommendations and to also provide grants  
342 that support food banks and other parts of the food distribution channel to meet the urgent needs  
343 as a result of COVID-19 by expanding services, which may include, but shall not be limited to:  
344 (i) information technology needs, including the development of online markets and delivery

345 systems, including an online system to link food system channels to identify and match  
346 agricultural and fishery products to consumers and markets, particularly to benefit food insecure  
347 communities; (ii) facility adaptation to new safety guidelines, including new signage and the  
348 installation of handwashing stations; (iii) expansion of storage and food preparation areas for  
349 food banks, food pantries or food distribution organizations; (iv) the purchase or lease of point-  
350 of-sale devices to provide to retailers at no cost to provide curbside pick-up and curbside  
351 payment service, including payment using Electronic Benefits Transfer cards; (v) capital support  
352 for food retailers in communities underserved by full grocery stores to increase capacity, expand  
353 offerings of health foods and maintain continuity of business operations; and (vi) storage and  
354 processing equipment to adapt to supply chain disruptions, including for cold and ambient  
355 storage and vehicles for distribution.....\$36,500,000
