By Messrs. Vargas of Haverhill and Rogers of Cambridge, a petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 139) of Andres X. Vargas, David M. Rogers and others relative to protecting internet access during the COVID-19 pandemic. Advanced Information Technology, the Internet and Cybersecurity.

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the One Hundred and Ninety-Second General Court (2021-2022)

An Act protecting internet access during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Whereas, The deferred operation of this act would tend to defeat its purpose, which is to forthwith make certain changes in law to protect internet access during the COVID-19 emergency, therefore it is hereby declared to be an emergency law, necessary for the immediate preservation of the public convenience.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1	SECTION 1.	As used in	this act,	the follo	wing wor	ds shall,	unless the	context	clearly
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- 2 requires otherwise, have the following meanings:
- 3 "Broadband Internet Access Service", means a mass-market retail service by wire or
 4 radio provided to customers in Massachusetts that provides the capability to transmit data to and
 5 receive data from all, or substantially all Internet endpoints, including but not limited to, any
 6 capabilities that are incidental to and enable the operation of the communications service, but
 7 excluding dial-up Internet access service. Broadband Internet Access Service also encompasses
 8 any service provided to customers in Massachusetts that provides a functional equivalent of that
 9 service or that is used to evade the protections set forth in this act.

10	"COVID-19 emergency", also known as COVID-19, means the state of emergency
11	concerning the novel coronavirus disease outbreak declared by the governor on March 10, 2020.
12	"Data cap or allowance", means a limit on, or a fee-based structure with the purpose of
13	limiting, the number of bits a consumer may download or upload during a period of time
14	specified by an Internet Service Provider.
15	"Internet Service Provider", means all entities that provide Broadband Internet Access
16	Service to an individual, corporation, government, or other customer in Massachusetts, however
17	for the purposes of this act, Internet Service Provider shall not mean Mobile Internet Service
18	Provider and shall not include entities providing only cellular internet service to subscribers.
19	"Mobile Broadband Internet Access Service", means a Broadband Internet Access
20	Service that serves end users primarily using mobile stations. Mobile Broadband Internet Access
21	Service includes, but is not limited to, Broadband Internet Access Services that use smartphones
22	or mobile-network-enabled tablets as the primary endpoints for connection to the Internet, as
23	well as mobile satellite broadband services. However, for the purposes of this act, Mobile
24	Broadband Internet Access Service shall not include hotspots provided to students for
25	educational purposes.
26	"Mobile Internet Service Provider", means all entities that provide Mobile Broadband
27	Internet Access Service to an individual, corporation, government, or other customer in
28	Massachusetts.
29	"Subscribers", means any existing and new customers of Broadband Internet Access
30	Service.

31	SECTION 2. (a) Notwithstanding any general or special law to the contrary, for the
32	duration of the COVID-19 emergency and 60 days thereafter, Internet Service Providers shall
33	not:
34	(1) increase the cost of any Broadband Internet Access Services for their subscribers;
35	(2) levy any new fees or charges related to Broadband Internet Access Services upon
36	their subscribers;
37	(3) impose new data caps or allowances onto their subscribers; or
38	(4) shut off Broadband Internet Access Service or services for subscribers that are unable
39	to pay overdue bill due to financial hardship caused by the COVID-19 emergency.
40	SECTION 3. For the duration of the COVID-19 emergency and 60 days thereafter, there
41	shall be a moratorium on any pre-existing data caps or allowances imposed by Internet Service
42	Providers.
43	SECTION 4. Mobile Internet Service Providers are exempt from the provisions in this
44	act.
45	SECTION 5. This act shall expire 60 days after the termination of the governor's March
46	10, 2020 declaration of a state of emergency. The governor may extend the provisions of this act
47	for a maximum of 180 days after the termination of the governor's March 10, 2020 declaration
48	of a state of emergency.
49	SECTION 6. Section 6A of chapter 25C of the General Laws is hereby repealed.
