An Act ensuring equal access to medical treatments essential for people with a developmental disability, intellectual disability, or autism.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 Chapter 118E of General Laws, as appearing in the 2018 Official Edition is hereby
2 amended by inserting after section 62 the following section:-

3 Section 63. The Division shall cover the cost of habilitative and rehabilitative medically
4 necessary treatments for individuals aged 21 and older who are receiving coverage under this
5 chapter and who have been diagnosed with any of the following disorders as defined in the most
6 recent version of the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders (DSM):

7 developmental disability, an intellectual disability, or autism spectrum disorder. The diagnoses
8 must be made by a licensed physician or a licensed psychologist who determines the care to be
9 medically necessary. Treatments shall include, but shall not be limited to, applied behavior
10 analysis provided or supervised by a licensed behavior analyst that is necessary to develop,
11 maintain or restore, to the maximum extent practicable, the functioning of an individual. In

- 12 addition, the Division shall cover the cost of both dedicated and non-dedicated augmentative and
- 13 alternative communication devices, including, but not limited to, medically necessary tablets.
