**In the One Hundred and Ninety-Second General Court
(2021-2022)**

An Act relative to group care facilities.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. Section 1A of chapter 15D of the General Laws, as appearing in the 2018
2 Official Edition, is hereby amended in the definition of “Group care facility” by adding after the
3 first sentence the following sentence:-

4 Private residential special education schools that provide regular residential care shall be
5 considered group care facilities only if the schools provide special education services that are
6 intended to lead to a high school degree or its equivalency, excluding independent living
7 programs, to children with special needs under the age of 22.
