By Mr. Moore, a petition (accompanied by bill, Senate, No. 135) of Michael O. Moore for legislation to require the evaluation of governmental services on children and families of the Commonwealth. Children, Families and Persons with Disabilities.

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the One Hundred and Ninety-Second General Court (2021-2022)

An Act requiring the evaluation of governmental services on children and families of the Commonwealth.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 Chapter 6A of the General Laws is hereby amended by adding after section 16BB the

2 following section:-

Section 16CC Notwithstanding any general or special law to the contrary, the executive office of health and human services shall conduct an evaluation and study, and issue an annual report concerning the impact of government funded programs and services on children and families of the commonwealth. The study shall measure the outcomes of such programs and services on children and families on short, intermediate and long term outcomes, and shall distinguish the effects by race, ethnicity, gender, region, and income to the extent possible.

9 The children and families programs and services to be evaluated shall include, but not be 10 limited to: MassHealth, home visiting, the Title V/Maternal and Child Health Program, early 11 intervention services, child welfare services, child c and early education services, elementary and

12	secondary education, youth services, department of mental health services, department of
13	housing and community services, Women, Infants and Children programs, Supplemental
14	Nutrition Assistance programs, Low Income Home Energy Assistance Programs, and
15	Transitional Aid to Families with Dependent Children.
16	For the purposes of this section, outcomes shall include but not be limited to:
17	Short term: access to and use of health care services, including, but not limited to,
18	primary care, specialty health care, behavioral health care, chronic health services, substance use
19	services, community and school health services, and hospitalizations, including emergency

The executive office in consultation with the relevant agencies may request and be

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34 services to enable the executive office to issue the annual report. In the course of its study 35 and evaluation the executive office shall maintain ongoing data capacity from the department of 36 public health (birth certificate, early intervention, home visiting), MassHealth, center for health 37 information analysis, department of housing and community development, office of child 38 advocate, department of children and families, office of the trial court, department of corrections, 39 department of youth services, department of elementary and secondary education, department of 40 mental health, department of labor, and such other departments, agencies and offices necessary 41 to create such reports.

The report shall be filed with the clerks of the house of representatives and senate, the house and senate chairs of the joint committee on children, families and persons with disabilities, joint committee on mental health and substance abuse, the joint committee on public health, the joint committee on health care financing and the house and senate committees on ways and means.

47 Notwithstanding any general or special law to the contrary, the executive office may
48 contract with a non-profit or educational entity to conduct data analytics on the data set
49 generated in the examination, provided that the executive office shall implement appropriate
50 privacy safeguards.

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
