An Act relative to hormonal contraceptives.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

1           SECTION 1. SECTION 5. Chapter 94C, as appearing in the 2018 Official Edition, is  
2 hereby amended by inserting, after section 19D, the following section:-

3           Section 19E. A registered pharmacist may prescribe and dispense hormonal contraceptive  
4 patches and self-administered oral hormonal contraceptives to a person who is:

5           (a) At least 18 years of age, regardless of whether the person has evidence of a previous  
6 prescription from a primary care practitioner or women's health care practitioner for a hormonal  
7 contraceptive patch or self-administered oral hormonal contraceptive; or

8           (b) Under 18 years of age, only if the person has evidence of a previous prescription from  
9 a primary care practitioner or women's health care practitioner for a hormonal contraceptive  
10 patch or self-administered oral hormonal contraceptive.

11           The board shall adopt rules to establish, in consultation with the Massachusetts Medical  
12 Board, the Massachusetts State Board of Nursing and the MassHealth, and in consideration of  
13 guidelines established by the American Congress of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, standard  
14 procedures for the prescribing of hormonal contraceptive patches and self-administered oral  
15 hormonal contraceptives by pharmacists. The rules adopted under this subsection must require a  
16 pharmacist to:

17           (a) Complete a training program approved by the State Board of Pharmacy that is related  
18 to prescribing hormonal contraceptive patches and self-administered oral hormonal  
19 contraceptives;

20           (b) Provide a self-screening risk assessment tool that the patient must use prior to the  
21 pharmacist's prescribing the hormonal contraceptive patch or self-administered oral hormonal  
22 contraceptive;

23           (c) Refer the patient to the patient's primary care practitioner or women's health care  
24 practitioner upon prescribing and dispensing the hormonal contraceptive patch or self-  
25 administered oral hormonal contraceptive;

26           (d) Provide the patient with a written record of the hormonal contraceptive patch or self-  
27 administered oral hormonal contraceptive prescribed and dispensed and advise the patient to  
28 consult with a primary care practitioner or women's health care practitioner; and

29           (e) Dispense the hormonal contraceptive patch or self-administered oral hormonal  
30 contraceptive to the patient as soon as practicable after the pharmacist issues the prescription.

31           The rules adopted must prohibit a pharmacist from:

32           (a) Requiring a patient to schedule an appointment with the pharmacist for the  
33   prescribing or dispensing of a hormonal contraceptive patch or self-administered oral hormonal  
34   contraceptive; and

35           (b) Prescribing and dispensing a hormonal contraceptive patch or self-administered oral  
36   hormonal contraceptive to a patient who does not have evidence of a clinical visit for women's  
37   health within the three years immediately following the initial prescription and dispensation of a  
38   hormonal contraceptive patch or self-administered oral hormonal contraceptive by a pharmacist  
39   to the patient.
