**In the One Hundred and Ninety-Second General Court
(2021-2022)**

Resolve establishing a study on providing absolute social security coverage for public employees.

1 **Resolved**, Notwithstanding any general or special law to the contrary, the Massachusetts
2 state retirement board, hereinafter “the board”, shall conduct a study that identifies, analyzes and
3 makes recommendations relative to the costs, benefits and issues of providing absolute social
4 security coverage for all current and future state and local government employees of the
5 commonwealth. For purposes of this section, state and local government employees of the
6 commonwealth shall mean all persons employed part-time and full-time by state or local
7 government entities of the commonwealth who pay into a supplementary public retirement
8 system of the commonwealth. Provided further, state and local employees shall also mean
9 employees of police and firefighter departments, employees of public elementary and secondary
10 schools, and employees of public education institutions beyond the secondary level.

11 The board shall study the costs, benefits and issues relating to social security coverage of
12 state and local employees including, but not limited to, the following: identify state and local
13 government employers in Massachusetts who are not permitted by the state’s Section 218
14 Agreement with the federal social security administration to be covered by social security; the
15 state and federal processes involved for implementing and mandating system-wide and gradual
16 social security coverage for all state and local government employees; subsequent impacts of
17 cost of living adjustments on social security coverage and benefits; subsequent impacts on state
18 and local taxes; subsequent impacts on existing state supplementary public retirement systems;
19 subsequent impacts on social security beneficiary rights of spouses, survivors and dependents of
20 state and local government employees who paid into a supplementary public retirement system
21 of the commonwealth; subsequent impacts on former employees, who no longer pay into
22 supplementary public retirement systems of the commonwealth, of state and local government
23 employers; issues relating to the effects of the federal windfall elimination provision and the
24 federal government pension offset on providing absolute social security coverage for state and
25 local employees; feasibility recommendations.

26 The board shall work in collaboration or consultation with, but not limited to: the public
27 employee retirement administration commission; the Massachusetts teachers’ retirement board;
28 other offices, departments and agencies of the commonwealth, including the department of
29 administration and finance and the treasurer’s office, as appropriate; employees of the federal
30 social security administration.

31 The board shall submit a report of its findings and recommendations to the clerks of the
32 house of representatives and the senate, the house and senate committees on ways and means, the
33 joint committee on revenue, the joint committee on labor and workforce development, joint

- 34 committee on municipalities and regional government, and the joint committee on public service,
35 not later than December 31, 2023.
