1	SECTION 1. Chapter 23A of the General Laws is hereby amended by inserting after
2	section 13T the following section:-
3	Section 13U. (a) For the purposes of this section, the following words shall have the
4	following meanings unless the context clearly requires otherwise:
5	"Executive director", the executive director of the office of travel and tourism under
6	section 13E.
7	"Secretary", the secretary of transportation under chapter 6C.
8	(b) Notwithstanding any general or special law to the contrary, the executive director, in
9	conjunction with the secretary, shall develop and implement a women's rights history trail
10	program that shall include, but not be limited to: (i) designating properties and sites that are
11	historically and thematically associated with the fight for women's rights and women's suffrage
12	and (ii) promoting education and awareness of the history of women's rights in the
13	commonwealth.

(c) The executive director and the secretary shall produce and make available appropriate
educational materials regarding the women's rights history trail program, which may include, but

shall not be limited to: (i) handbooks; (ii) maps; (iii) exhibits; (iv) uniform signs; (v) interpretive
guides; and (vi) electronic information.

(d) The executive director shall develop vacation itineraries based on the women's rights
history trail program that shall identify: (i) surrounding attractions; (ii) restaurants; (iii) farms;
(iv) lodging; and (v) any other exhibit or place that may be part of the historical theme linking
the properties and sites in the women's rights history trail program.

(e) The secretary may erect and maintain signs on the state highway system or trails
designated pursuant to this section; provided, however, that any state highway or trail
designation shall be of a ceremonial nature and the official name of any such highway or trail
shall not be changed as a result of such a designation.

26 SECTION 2. (a) There shall be a women's rights history trail task force to research, 27 solicit public input and make recommendations for sites, properties and attractions to be included 28 in the women's rights history trail program established pursuant to section 13U of chapter 23A 29 of the General Laws; provided, however, that the recommendations shall include the state house 30 among the recommended sites. In making such recommendations, the task force shall consider 31 sites that: (i) are historically and thematically associated with the fight for women's rights and 32 women's suffrage, including the contributions of women veterans; (ii) are geographically 33 diverse; and (iii) commemorate individuals who reflect racial, ethnic, cultural and economic 34 diversity.

(b) The task force shall research, solicit public input and make recommendations to
 increase the representation of women and women artists in the works of art in the state house to

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the art commission for the state house established under section 20 of chapter 6 of the GeneralLaws.

39 (c) The task force shall consist of: the chairs of the joint committee on tourism, arts and 40 cultural development, who shall serve as co-chairs; 2 members of the house of representatives, 1 41 of whom shall be appointed by the minority leader of the house of representatives; 2 members of 42 the senate, 1 of whom shall be appointed by the minority leader of the senate; the chairs of the 43 caucus of women legislators or their designees; the executive director of the office of travel and 44 tourism or a designee; the secretary of transportation or a designee; the executive director of the 45 commission on the status of women; 1 member appointed by the commission on the status of 46 women; 1 member appointed by the commissioner of veterans' services who shall represent the 47 interests of women veterans; 1 member appointed by the art commission for the state house; 1 48 member appointed by the chairs of the task force who shall work at a college or university in the 49 commonwealth and shall be an expert in women's history; and 1 member who is a representative of the Massachusetts Historical Society. 50

(d) The task force shall submit its findings and recommendations to the clerks of the
senate and house of representatives, the executive director of the office of travel and tourism, the
secretary of transportation and the art commission for the state house not later than March 1,
2023.

(e) In developing and implementing the women's rights history trail program under
section 13U of chapter 23A of the General Laws, the executive director of the office of travel
and tourism and secretary of transportation shall consider the recommendations of the women's
rights history trail task force.

(f) In advising the governor and general court on future artistic matters at the state house
pursuant to subsection (e) of section 20 of chapter 6 of the General Laws, the art commission for
the state house shall consider the recommendations of the women's rights history trail task force.
