Pursuant to Article XLVIII of the Amendments to the Constitution of the Commonwealth, as amended, the undersigned qualified voters of the Commonwealth, ten in number at least, hereby petition for the enactment into law of the following measure:

The Commonwealth of Alassachusetts

In the One Hundred and Ninety-Third General Court (2023-2024)

An Act requiring that districts certify that students have mastered the skills, competencies and knowledge of the state standards as a replacement for the MCAS graduation requirement.

Be it enacted by the People, and by their authority, as follows:

1 SECTION 1.

- Section 1D of chapter 69 of the General Laws, as appearing in the 2022 Official Edition, is hereby amended by striking from the first sentence of sub-paragraph (i) the words,", as
- 4 measured by the assessment instruments described in section one I." and replacing them with the
- 5 following: "by satisfactorily completing coursework that has been certified by the student's
- 6 district as showing mastery of the skills, competencies, and knowledge contained in the state
- 7 academic standards and curriculum frameworks in the areas measured by the MCAS high school
- 8 tests described in section one I administered in 2023, and in any additional areas determined by
- 9 the board.".

Summary of 23-36.

This proposed law would eliminate the requirement that a student pass the Massachusetts

Comprehensive Assessment System (MCAS) tests (or other statewide or district-wide

assessments) in mathematics, science and technology, and English in order to receive a high
school diploma. Instead, in order for a student to receive a high school diploma, the proposed
law would require the student to complete coursework certified by the student's district as
demonstrating mastery of the competencies contained in the state academic standards in
mathematics, science and technology, and English, as well as any additional areas determined by
the Board of Elementary and Secondary Education.
