HOUSE No. 5077

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

**In the One Hundred and Ninety-Third General Court
(2023-2024)**

An Act making appropriations for the fiscal year 2024 to provide for supplementing certain existing appropriations and for certain other activities and projects.

Whereas, The deferred operation of this act would tend to defeat its purposes, which are to make supplemental appropriations for fiscal year 2024 and to make certain changes in law, each of which is immediately necessary to carry out those appropriations or to accomplish other important public purposes, therefore it is hereby declared to be an emergency law, necessary for the immediate preservation of the public convenience.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. To provide for supplementing certain items in the general appropriation act
2 and other appropriation acts for fiscal year 2024, the sums set forth in section 2 are hereby
3 appropriated from the General Fund unless specifically designated otherwise in this act or in
4 those appropriation acts, for the several purposes and subject to the conditions specified in this
5 act or in those appropriation acts, and subject to the laws regulating the disbursement of public
6 funds for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2024. These sums shall be in addition to any amounts
7 previously appropriated and made available for the purposes of those items. These sums shall be
8 made available through the fiscal year ending June 30, 2025.

276 Official Edition, is hereby amended by striking out, in line 49, the words “June 2” and inserting
277 in place thereof the following words:- July 31.

278 SECTION 4. The first sentence of subsection (a) of section 19 of chapter 15D of the
279 General Laws, as inserted by section 36 of chapter 140 of the acts of 2024, is hereby amended by
280 striking out the words “separate, non-budgeted special revenue” and inserting in place thereof the
281 following word:- budgeted.

282 SECTION 5. Said chapter 15D is hereby further amended by adding the following
283 section:-

284 Section 22. (a) As used in this section, the following terms shall, unless the context
285 clearly requires otherwise, have the following meanings:

286 “Imagination Library of Massachusetts program”, a comprehensive statewide initiative to
287 encourage children from birth to 5 years of age to develop a love of reading and learning.

288 “Qualified local entity”, an existing or new local Dolly Parton’s Imagination Library
289 affiliate that agrees to fund up to 50 per cent of the costs of the Imagination Library of
290 Massachusetts program.

291 (b) Subject to appropriation, the department shall establish the Imagination Library of
292 Massachusetts program to promote the development of a comprehensive statewide initiative to
293 encourage preschool age children to develop a love of reading and learning. The department
294 shall develop, implement and promote a comprehensive statewide initiative to
295 encourage children from birth to 5 years of age to develop a love of reading and learning.

296 (c)(1) Subject to appropriation, the Imagination Library of Massachusetts program shall
297 provide, through Dolly Parton’s Imagination Library, 1 age-appropriate book to each registered
298 child from birth to age 5. Books shall be sent monthly to each child’s home at no cost to families.

299 (2) Subject to appropriation, the Imagination Library of Massachusetts program shall
300 contribute funds to qualified local entities participating in Dolly Parton’s Imagination Library.

301 (d) The department shall administer the Imagination Library of Massachusetts program,
302 including, but not limited to:

303 (i) promoting the statewide development of local Dolly Parton’s Imagination Library
304 affiliates;

305 (ii) coordinating with qualified local entities to increase enrollment;

306 (iii) engaging with communities, qualified local entities and nonprofit leaders across the
307 commonwealth;

308 (iv) implementing a statewide marketing and communications campaign, including, but
309 not limited to, an ongoing public awareness campaign to:

310 (A) make donors aware of the opportunity to donate to the Imagination Library of
311 Massachusetts program; and

312 (B) make the public aware of the Imagination Library of Massachusetts program and of
313 how to register eligible children; and

314 (v) coordinating the local match requirement for approved qualified local entities as well
315 as the reimbursement of local program costs for books and mailing, as needed.

316 (e) The department shall, in coordination with the qualified local entity, ensure all
317 personally identifiable information is handled in accordance with all applicable state and federal
318 laws and regulations.

319 (f) Annually, not later than March 15, the department shall submit a report to the clerks of
320 the house of representatives and senate, the house and senate committees on ways and means, the
321 chairs of the joint committee on education, the executive office for administration and finance
322 and the executive office of education on the activities of the program, including, but not limited
323 to: (i) the total number of children enrolled, delineated by municipality; (ii) the number of books
324 sent to enrolled children, delineated by municipality; (iii) the number of books returned as
325 undeliverable, delineated by municipality; (iv) any activity from the Imagination Library of

326 Massachusetts Fund established in section 2JJJJJ of chapter 29, including, but not limited to,
327 deposits and expenditures; (v) the number of qualified local entities across the commonwealth,
328 their locations, local match amount contributed and other local partners, if any; and (vi) any
329 other information the department deems relevant.

330 (g) The department may promulgate regulations for the implementation of the
331 Imagination Library of Massachusetts program.

332 SECTION 6. Section 31 of chapter 23B of the General Laws, as appearing in section 5 of
333 chapter 150 of the acts of 2024, is hereby amended by striking out the figure “2FFFFFF”, each
334 time it appears, and inserting in place thereof, in each instance, the following figure:-
335 2KKKKKK.

336 SECTION 7. Subsection (f) of section 2BBBBBB of chapter 29 of the General Laws,
337 inserted by section 57 of chapter 140 of the acts of 2024, is hereby amended by striking out the
338 first sentence and inserting in place thereof the following 2 sentences:- Annual expenditures
339 from the fund shall not exceed that year’s spending threshold, less the dedicated transportation
340 income surtax revenue amount. Each year’s spending threshold shall be equal to the prior year
341 spending threshold plus an adjustment factor equal to the 10-year rolling rate of growth of
342 income subject to the tax specified in subsection (d) of section 4 of chapter 62 as certified by the
343 commissioner of revenue.

344 SECTION 8. Said chapter 29 is hereby further amended by inserting after section 2IIIII,
345 inserted by section 58 of said chapter 140, the following 2 sections:-

346 Section 2JJJJJ. (a) There is hereby established and set up on the books of the
347 commonwealth a separate, non-budgeted special revenue fund known as the Imagination Library
348 of Massachusetts Fund which shall be administered by the secretary of education.

349 (b) There shall be credited to the fund: (i) revenue from appropriations and other money
350 authorized by the general court and specifically designated to be credited to the fund; (ii) funds
351 from public and private sources such as gifts, grants and donations; and (iii) interest earned on
352 money in the fund. Amounts credited to the fund shall be expended without further
353 appropriation. No expenditure made from the fund shall cause the fund to be in deficit at any
354 point. Money remaining in the fund at the end of a fiscal year shall not revert to the General
355 Fund. The fund shall not be subject to section 5C.

356 (c) Funds shall be made available to provide age-appropriate books on a monthly basis, at
357 home, to each child registered in the Imagination Library of Massachusetts program, established
358 pursuant to section 22 of chapter 15D, from birth to their fifth birthday, inclusive, at no cost to
359 families or guardians, in coordination with Dolly Parton's Imagination Library.

360 Section 2KKKKKK. (a) There shall be established and set up on the books of the
361 commonwealth a separate fund known as the Fair Housing Fund. There shall be credited to the
362 fund: (i) revenue from appropriations or other funds authorized by the general court and
363 specifically designated for the fund; (ii) any gifts, grants or private contributions; (iii) any
364 interest on the fund's assets; and (iv) any other sources. Amounts credited to the fund shall be
365 expended without further appropriation. Any balance in the fund at the close of a fiscal year shall
366 be available for expenditure in subsequent fiscal years and shall not be transferred to any other
367 fund or revert to the General Fund; provided, that the comptroller shall report the amount
