The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the One Hundred and Ninety-Third General Court (2023-2024)

An Act to enhance hospital care for those with autism and intellectual and developmental disabilities.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1	SECTION 1. Notwithstanding any general or special law to the contrary, within one year
2	of the date of enactment, the executive office of health and human services shall create and
3	maintain an integrated state plan to develop training and education as well as standards of care
4	by appropriate healthcare providers related to the diagnosis, treatment, and care of patients with
5	intellectual and developmental disabilities, including autism spectrum disorders and those with
6	intersecting marginalized identities. The plan should include implementation steps and
7	recommendations from the advisory committee on intellectual and developmental disabilities
8	that includes, but is not limited to: (1) continuing education requirements for applicable
9	healthcare providers related to diagnosis, treatment, and care of patients with intellectual and

10 developmental disabilities, including autism spectrum disorders and those with intersecting 11 marginalized identities; (2) implementation of a strategy for the adoption of standards for improving assessment and diagnosis of intellectual and developmental disabilities, including 12 13 autism spectrum disorders and those with intersecting marginalized identities, for patients during 14 routine outpatient primary care examinations; and (3) coordination with applicable state 15 licensure boards, as recommended by the advisory committee on intellectual and developmental 16 disabilities, the adoption of appropriate continuing education requirements related to intellectual 17 and developmental disabilities, including autism spectrum disorders and those with intersecting 18 marginalized identities, as part of licensure renewals.

19 Within six months of the date of enactment, there is hereby established an advisory 20 committee on intellectual and developmental disabilities, including autism spectrum disorders 21 and those with intersecting marginalized identities. Said advisory committee shall be comprised 22 of the following experts: (i) a designee of the secretary of health and human services; (ii) a 23 designee of the commissioner of public health; (iii) two health care providers with expertise in 24 the diagnosis, treatment, and care of patients with intellectual and developmental disabilities, 25 including autism spectrum disorders and those with intersecting marginalized identities; (iv) two 26 patient advocates or family members of those with intellectual and developmental disabilities, 27 including autism spectrum disorders and those with intersecting marginalized identities; and (iv) 28 five statewide trade organizations that include the Arc of Massachusetts, the Massachusetts 29 Health and Hospital Association, the Massachusetts Medical Society, and Massachusetts 30 Psychiatric Society, and the Massachusetts Psychological Association. The advisory council 31 shall develop recommendations for statewide standards for healthcare professionals regarding 32 diagnosis, treatment, and care for patients with intellectual and developmental disabilities,

- 33 including but not limited to, autism spectrum disorders and those with intersecting marginalized
- 34 identities. Said standards shall include recommendations for training of healthcare providers,
- 35 including but not limited to, physicians, psychologists, psychiatrists, physician assistants,
- 36 registered nurses, and advanced practice registered nurses.
