## The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

**In the One Hundred and Ninety-Fourth General Court  
(2025-2026)**

An Act concerning the safety of autistic and alzheimer individuals.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

1 Chapter 118E of the General Laws is hereby amended by inserting after section 86 the  
2 following section:-

4 (i) "Technology-Assisted Tracking Device" shall mean any wearable device that  
5 complies with the following imperatives:

6 a) Waterproof and able to function under water (which is a major destination as seen  
7 above), compliant with IP66 and IP68 standards

8                   b) Works indoors or under cover (Radio Frequency is the best technology for this), and  
9                    does not need direct line of sight to the sky (GPS)

10 c) Not dependent on third-party public communication networks (such as cellular, GSM,  
11 GPRS, or similar as these are NOT prevalent everywhere)

12           d) Wrist or ankle strap needs to be tamper-resistant, but changeable by the caregiver

13           directly

14           e) System specifics need to avoid false alarms in order not to waste LE and SAR time,

15           and have a patient specific code for each device so as to avoid mistaken identities

16           (b) A health benefit plan shall provide full coverage, subject to all applicable co-

17           payments, coinsurance, deductibles, and out-of-pocket limits, for insured individuals who are

18           diagnosed by a license physician with dementia, Alzheimer's disease, or Autism spectrum

19           Disorder, to obtain a Technology-Assisted Tracking Device if they or their guardian choose.
