**In the One Hundred and Ninety-Fourth General Court
(2025-2026)**

An Act to transform the Commonwealth's emergency response system and create housing strategies to end the homelessness of unaccompanied adults.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

3 “Congregate shelter”, a shelter for unhoused persons in which multiple individuals share
4 common shared sleeping areas without private living quarters.

5 “Continuum of care”, as defined in Section 578.3 of Title 24 of the Code of Federal
6 Regulations.

7 “Non-congregate shelter”, a shelter for unhoused persons in which said persons sleep in
8 individual or shared bedrooms.

9 “Permanent supportive housing”, permanent housing in which supportive services are
10 provided to assist unhoused persons who are experiencing homelessness to live independently.

11 (b) The executive office of housing and livable communities, in consultation with the
12 Massachusetts Municipal Association, shall conduct a study to determine: (1) projected future

13 shelter and housing demand to determine the type and amount of permanent supportive housing,
14 non-congregate and congregate shelter programmatic models necessary to reduce reliance on
15 shelter and meet housing demand; (2) subsequent housing and shelter unit needs per
16 municipality; (3) an inventory of existing congregate and non-congregate shelter beds; and (4)
17 the feasibility and costs associated with converting existing congregate beds to non-congregate
18 housing or permanent supportive housing.

19 (c) The executive office shall submit a report with: (1) a summary of the results of the
20 study conducted pursuant to subsection (b); (2) a plan to build sufficient permanent supportive
21 housing and non-congregate shelter solutions to meet the projected bed needs pursuant to
22 subsection (b), provided that said report shall include a five-year implementation goal to meet
23 the unmet needs of affordable housing capacity for each municipality in the commonwealth
24 based on the results of the study conducted under subsection (b) to ensure adequate permanent
25 supportive housing capacity statewide; and (3) necessary resources to better support
26 unaccompanied adult persons experiencing homelessness, including, but not limited to, long-
27 term vouchers, shallow subsidy pools, rapid re-housing resources, permanent supportive housing,
28 alternative construction models such as modular construction, micro-units, and repurposed
29 hotels,; provided that resources must be assessed specifically for unhoused persons with complex
30 needs, including but not limited to, elderly, disabled, medically complex, or LGBTQ+ persons
31 experiencing homelessness.

32 (e) The executive office shall submit the report pursuant to subsection (c) no later than
33 December 31, 2026, to the house and senate clerks, the house and senate committees on ways
34 and means and the house and senate chairs of the joint committee on housing.
