Public Records



S.2120 An Act to Improve Public Records

Summary

- Reduces costs for a records requestor, and ensures timely compliance with public records requests. It also prohibits charging for records if the agency or municipality does not provide the records within 15 days of the request or does not respond to the requestor within ten days.
- Limits the amount that state agencies and municipalities can charge for production of the records. The limits are set at 5 cents per page for copies, down from 20-50 cents per page under current law, plus the cost of a storage device.
- Finally, the bill requires state entities and encourages municipalities to post online many commonly requested public records. In addition, records are required to be provided in electronic format unless requested otherwise.



STATUS



Signed Into Law

The new law brings Massachusetts into line with 47 other states and the federal government by allowing attorney's fees to be awarded to plaintiffs who are victorious in court when denied records.
