S.727 An Act Relative to Tagging S.728 An Act Relative to the Penalty for Vandalism

Summary

- Tagging is defined under the law as "Whoever sprays or applies paint or places a sticker upon a building, wall, fence, sign, tablet, gravestone, monument or other object or thing on a public way or adjoined to it, or in public view, or on private property..."
- Vandalism is defined as "Whoever intentionally, willfully and maliciously or wantonly, paints, marks, scratches, etches or otherwise marks, injures, mars, defaces or destroys the real or personal property of another including but not limited to a wall, fence, building, sign, rock, monument, gravestone or tablet..."
- 3 S.727 Removes the penalty of a drivers license suspension for those found guilty of "tagging."
- 4 S.728 Removes the penalty of a drivers license suspension for those found guilty of "vandalism".

The bill was sponsored by Senator William N. Brownsberger (D-Belmont)


