By Mr. Stanley of Waltham, a petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 259) of Thomas M. Stanley, Matthew A. Beaton and Tom Sannicandro that the Department of Environmental Protection Office of Research and Standards conduct a long-term research program on contaminants in striped bass. Environment, Natural Resources and Agriculture.

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year Two Thousand Eleven

An Act promoting the public health of the citizens of the Commonwealth through the testing and labeling of striped bass.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 The Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection Office of Research and
2 Standards shall conduct a long-term research program on contaminants in Striped Bass.
3 Contaminants to be looked for shall include but not be limited to mercury, polychlorinated
4 biphenyls, dioxin, mirex, dichlorodiphenyltrichloroethane, chlordane and dieldrin. The results of
5 said research program shall be published annually and forwarded to the Massachusetts
6 Department of Public Health for the purpose of publishing warnings to the public should levels
7 of contaminants in the Striped Bass cause health concerns due to consumption of the fish by
8 pregnant women or the general population. The research program shall be conducted as to have
9 the maximum impact for the safety of the general population based around the commercial and
10 recreational Striped Bass fishing season in the Commonwealth. Should there be a finding of
11 elevated contaminants in Striped Bass by the Massachusetts Department of Public Health, the
12 Department shall direct the Massachusetts Division of Marine Fisheries to institute a labeling

13 and notification program for Striped Bass caught commercially and sold for human consumption
14 in fish stores, fish markets and on the dock or wharf in Massachusetts as well as other markets
15 the fish are sold into.
