CURRENT LAW:

Section 6B of Chapter 159B outlines the Department of Public Utilities' authority related to the towing of motor vehicles. It sets a maximum daily charge for the storage of vehicles that have been involuntarily towed or transported by police or public authority.

SUMMARY:

This bill increases the maximum storage charge for non-commercial passenger motor vehicles (max. capacity of nine people) from \$35/day to \$49/day.
